PROGRAM FOR APRIL

LECTURE ~ "PICK A SHAPE, ANY SHAPE, WHAT SHAPE ARE YOU?"

Marilyn Doheny is both a people person and a fabric person. She travels the world inspiring others via her innovative classes, delightful empowering lectures and amazingly beautiful quilt exhibitions. Her life is filled with accomplishments both professionally and personally. She is a single mother of three - now grown children, a dynamo quilt author with over 35 books, patterns and clever rulers to her name! She is an award winning publisher too! She shares her knowledge and infectious spirit generously and freely - She knows that we are all in the magical world of fabric and geometry together, having the ride of our lives! You will be captivated and em-



powered after spending time in her company. Her designs appear complex yet she presents the simplest of techniques to accomplish amazing visual complexity - easily! She loves exploring variations, what she calls "diversity on a theme" and her favorite quote is, "Let the beauty you love be what you do - there are a thousand ways to kneel and kiss the ground." Her class room motto is "If you are not having fun, then you are not doing it right."

This is an amazing presentation about universal meanings embedded within geometric shapes. There are five Universal shapes which have been present in all art history, in every culture, for all time. What each shape means "universally" is astounding and even more profound is what our personal, "order of preference" for these shapes tell us about ourselves. As guilters this is profound enlightenment and insight because guilts are primarily geometric shapes....and they are certainly our voice as a guilter! This is a lively, audience participation lecture. This is something you will not want to miss! A special challenge is going to be offered to those in attendance too, so don't miss it on Thursday, April 17th, 10 am.

WORKSHOP ~ "TRIAD INTERLOCK"

The workshop "Triad Interlock" will be held at the Veterans Building on April 18. This class features an elaborate interlocking pattern which is achieved by a very clever technique using at least three different strata units. This is an exciting workshop that will be a fun challenge for all levels of quilters.




ganic. They are influenced by her love of nature and all its wonders. She teaches her surface de-


workshop guidelines

technique sharing workshops

I am so excited about all the Technique Sharing Workshops that are now set up for the rest of 2008!

At our next meeting, April 17th, bring your knitting needles and baby yarn and learn two different ways to knit baby caps which can be used by premature babies cared for at our local hospitals. Bring four size 5 double-pointed needles, or two size 8 needles (regular or circular), and some baby yarn (acrylic is preferred, to avoid allergy problems for the babies).

On May 15, join Barbara Youngblood for Technique Sharing after the meeting and learn how to make Quick & Easy Pillowcases. Bring your fabric and machine and finish a pillowcase before you leave, or just watch and learn! Making this pillowcase is so fast and fun it's hard to believe! It makes a perfect quick gift and it's fun to make pillowcases that match your quilts. This process is really something to see!

For details and supply lists for both of these TSW's, see the new TSW page on the SRQG website. Technique Sharing Workshops (TSW for short) are free, and take place at our guild meetings, always beginning after the lunch break and lasting between 30 min. and 2 hours, depending on the topic. These workshops, led or taught by our own members on a volunteer basis, give our members a chance to share, learn and practice various special techniques related to quilting.

library news

Spring has arrived and the cleaning/organizing bug has even bit our library volunteers. We have all been busy trying to make it easier for everyone to locate books and magazines we are searching for.

Our ever-growing library (now officially over 2,000 books on our shelves!) could not be without the help of so many. If you are new to the guild, helping out in the library for five minutes, an hour, or all day, is a great way to meet people and find your way around. If you do not like the task you are offered, speak up – there are many others to choose from.

Cora Stewart not only made several great looking quilts for Lavella's Community Quilts Projects, but also donated the book to our Library! ALLEGRO by Atkinson Designs uses fat quarters to make a very easy block that can be used in four different ways to vary the look of quilts.

Phyllis Gallaway obtained for us the DVD SALLY COLLINS TEACHES YOU PRECISION PIECING, which elaborates upon the techniques Sally uses in her book MASTERING PRECISION PIECING. Reading the book is a must for anyone who wishes to improve upon his or her cutting, pinning, pressing, and stitching. This DVD is definitely your favorite flavor of frosting to spread on her delicious cake of a book – in fact, everyone should be studying ALL of her books to find out what makes award-winning quilts.

MAPLE LEAF QUILTS – 12 PROJECTS, 9 TRIANGLE TECHNIQUES by Ilene Bartos – Even if you do not plan on ever making a maple leaf quilt, this is a GREAT book to have in your library as it gives you nine options to make perfect triangles with perfect points. You can actually try each method and use them in a sampler! I have put an asterisk (*) next to this book on my master list as I really like it.

QUILTS ON THE DOUBLE — DOZENS OF EASY STRIP-PIECED DESIGNS by Judy Hooworth and Margaret Rolfe — and this book also gets an "*" on my list. This technique is suitable for a beginner, but the results are definitely complicated looking. When you cut strips you are actually cutting for TWO quilts — same color, but an entirely different look. The blocks are very simple, and the real fun comes when placing them on the design wall — endless arrangements!

ADVENTURE & APPLIQUE - TRAVELING THE WORLD WITH AWARD-WINNING QUILTER SUZ-ANNE MARSHALL by Suzanne Marshall - the author lists the judges' comments about her quilts and how she has learned from them. Also - her husband, Garland, shares his thoughts about her quilts, travels, and inspiration. Do you hate hand quilting with a frame but are embarrassed to admit it? After seeing Suzanne's quilts

your guilt will be erased. This book is filled with her tips for making hand appliqué easier.

Jennifer Chiaverini, the very popular author of novels about quilting and quilters, has written her third companion book of quilt patterns, along with excerpts of several of her most recent novels. MORE ELM CREEK QUILTS – 30+ TRADI-



TIONAL BLOCKS, 11 PROJECTS, FAVORITE CHARACTER SKETCHES is such a nice reminder of the books and the characters who have become our friends. A bonus is reading how Jennifer and her novels have influenced people to quilt.

FAT-QUARTER FANCYWORK – APPLIQUE CUT TO ORDER, ANTIQUE DESIGNS MADE WITH TODAY'S FAT QUARTERS by Karla Menaugh, *Barbara Brackman* (I am highlighting Barbara's name as she is a well-known, influential author who has spoken at our guild and many of you seek out her work), and Cherie Ralston - This skinny little book includes the authors' sense of humor about the word "fat."

OUR FAVORITE QUILTMAKER SUSAN MC CORD – THE UNFORGETTABLE ARTISTRY OF AN INDIANA QUILTER – by *Barbara Brackman*, Shauna Christensen, and Deb Rowden – Susan McCord lived from 1829-1909, and was one of the most innovative quiltmakers of the 19th century. Enjoy a history lesson and appliqué quilts at the same time.

CALICO COWBOYS by Karla Menaugh and *Barbara Brackman* - 7 quilts, 5 coordinating projects, plus cowboy stories and history.

SUNBONNET SUE CELEBRATES THE HOLIDAYS – STITCH 3-D CALENDAR BLOCKS DEPICTING SUNBONNET SUE IN A VARIETY OF COSTUMES AND HOLIDAY ACTIVITIES by Marian Shenk

Since it is never too early to start on Christmas projects, check out Thimbleberries CHRISTMAS STREETS – COUNTDOWN TO CHRISTMAS by Lynette Jensen.

SLASH YOUR STASH QUILTS – 8 RECIPES TO REDUCE YOUR STASH by Claudia E. Plett – No fabric requirement amounts are given, but each project includes the number of blocks needed – great for scraps! There is even a pattern for the popular "Bento Box."

QUILTING THE GREAT OUTDOORS – DOZENS OF APPLIQUED WILDLIFE BLOCKS TO CREATE IMPRESSIVE QUILTS, WALLHANGINGS, AND HOME DECORATING PROJECTS PLUS 24 QUILT PROJECTS by Debbie Field (I just love when the title on the cover of the book writes my review for me!).

SAY IT WITH STITCHES – NEW EMBROIDERY DE-SIGNS FOR LETTERS AND WORDS by Sharon and Kristin Jankowicz is not technically a "quilting" book, but it will be very useful in adding words to quilts (think about our Challenge this year ~~ VOTE 2008!), and for making labels. I am filing it with in our EMBELLISH-MENT section. If there are at least three books that I can put into a "category" it makes it easier for us to locate them. There is a "category" list next to the laptop computer in the back of the room. The three black cabinets in the rooms across the hall from our meeting room have lists of the categories taped to their inside doors. We have categories for such items as Appliqué, Babies and Kids, Christmas and Holidays, Foundation (Paper) Piecing, Japanese, Quilting Patterns, and many more.

SPRING SERENADE – A HARMONY OF WOOL & COTTON APPLIQUE PROJECTS – 12 DELIGHTFUL DESIGNS by Sherry Bonnice. Check out the cute bunny sniffing a daffodil in case you need inspiration to make a Friendship Block for Valeska Lattin. The expression on the face on the little bear checking out the beehive is really adorable.

Justine Lott suggested I add FOLLOW-THE-LINE QUILTING DESIGNS – VOLUME THREE – FULL-SIZE PATTERNS FOR BLOCKS AND BORDERS by Mary M. Covey to our library. We have the first volume, but somehow I missed purchasing volume two. Any interest? If so, e-mail me! There are twenty pattern "groups" in this box, including designs for blocks, borders, and setting triangles. Love the bunnies, and the chickens, and the lizards, and the houses, and not to forget the trees . . .

Melissa Trunick asked for a book that SHOULD have been in our library a long time ago, SEW ONE AND YOU'RE DONE – MAKING A QUILT FROM A SINGLE BLOCK by Evelyn Sloppy. Evelyn spoke at our guild recently, and we all admired her designs. I cannot believe this book slipped through the cracks. As I keep saying to all of you – DO let me know if you find something we should have on our shelves. I saw the results of this book in two quilts that Karen Taylor made for her new twin niece and nephew, and was very impressed. I am definitely putting a star (*) next to this title on the book list. This is going to be a hit for those who make Community Quilts as the pieces are larger, thus less cutting and sewing, and quicker – but without sacrificing a great look!

Okay, the quilt challenge is not due until September but you know it's never too early to start thinking about the quilt you want to enter into the challenge. What are the requirements? They're easy. The theme is the historic election of 2008 and celebrating "Freedom of Choice" in our country . All you have to do is make a quilt with the words "Vote" and "2008" on it somewhere. The guilt can be any size, any color, any topic, any technique. How easy is that? What do you choose? Patriotic, political, current events, issues, your home sweet home...? For this month, here are some political and issue ideas to get you going and motivated:



COUNTRY NEEDS We are all aware of the antique quilts owned by museums and those "lucky few" throughout the country. Some of the most valuable ones were the ones that conveyed the political times of the era. So just think, if your quilt survives a hundred years from now it may be worth millions of dollars (inflation added)! And of those antique political-themed quilts, some of the most valuable ones are the ones that conveyed the "unpopular" message or the losing candidate. It's more valuable now because it is so unique. So don't think your quilt challenge has to be the one about the "winning" candidate of 2008. Your challenge can reflect the candidates remaining in the race so far or make one reflecting your choice - even if they have already dropped out. Remember, the more unique often the more valuable!


> It can be about an idea that is being hotly debated during this election cycle (for example global warming, the economy, the war in Iraq etc.). Or it can be about an event that has occurred during this race (for example the candidates on Saturday Night Live, the debates, the early primaries). Or it can be the slogans that we've been hearing (for example "experience", "reform", "change", "yes we can", etc.) Just look at any of the candidates web-sites and you'll get oodles of ideas.

> The challenge quilt can be funny, edgy or serious. It can make fun of a candidate or a slogan or it can reflect the seriousness of the issues facing us as Americans; the war, the environment, terrorists etc. Your challenge can be direct as in "VOTE FOR McCAIN IN 2008" or it can be subtle, such as a landscape quilt depicting a beautiful environment. In September you'll explain why this is a Vote 2008 quilt. Your explanation can be that this is what the world will look like if candidate X wins. The Underground Railroad quilts of the Civil war were subtle "political" quilts - yours too can be created in that vein. Just remember this is all in fun. No one is going to be judged on their political views but rather on their ability to convey the choices that we make this

year in 2008 in a quilt! Who knows, campaign managers are being fired right and left in this race so a candidate might just want you to fill in their spot and help them win the presidency, and if you're really, really good perhaps you'll decide to run for office in the year 2012. You KNOW we'll all be behind you 100%. That's what this country needs - a quilter for President, one to bind this country together and mend us to the world as one big family. So get going -- this country NEEDS YOU!
