

President's Message

The Santa Rosa Quilt Guild prides itself for the extensive community outreach it achieves primarily through Community Quilts. In the past couple years we have also provided hundreds of quilts to Viet Nam veterans, hundreds of knitted nests to the Bird Rescue Center, "fidget aprons" for people with memory loss in skilled nursing facilities, quilts for survivors of last year's Valley Fire, and so much more.

In the interest of expanding our involvement in the community, two other events are happening in March.



Santa Rosa resident Catherine Reisman and her husband are travelling to Cuba this month with a local group of physicians who are graduates of Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. They will be touring hospitals, nursing homes, and a school for autistic children. Their Cuban connections asked them to bring some small "gifts" for these institutionalized folks. Catherine reached out to SRQG via the website and requested 9-12 small guilts for the children in the pediatric hospital. Although we received the request on short notice, we were able to donate a dozen small guilts for them to take. Catherine wrote, "Years ago, a friend of mine used to make guilts for babies and small children. She may have even worked with your group. While I realize that Cuba is not in our Santa Rosa community per se, we will be seeing people who have so little. I thought a small guilt could bring comfort to little ones who are hospitalized. And, it would be such a nice act of goodwill as our two countries are mending relations after so many years. Our group is called 'Vision with Compassion.' Thank you for your consideration!" I'm so very happy we were able to help out. Catherine has offered to give us a short presentation about the trip at our meeting in April.

KRCB, our local PBS station, has a fund raiser presentation scheduled for March 5 based on "Quilts of Valor II." We have been invited by the station to talk about quilting, SRQG, and the concept of community quilts during the breaks in the presentation. Linda Hooper, Jan Nilsen

and Genelle Voorhees will be interviewed with their own quilts as the background. According to the program description, "Quilts of Valor II' reunites national quilting celebrities Alex Anderson, Mark Lipinski and host Marianne Fons from the original Quilts of Valor to work on one magnificent, new Quilt of Valor. As they sew, the quilting gurus share quilt-making tips with viewers and speak from the heart about what being involved in making quilts for veterans has come to mean to them. The program also features stories from Nebraska, California, North Carolina and Washington, D.C., introducing viewers to the people who make Quilts of Valor and the people who receive them." For the first showing (we'll let you know when there are repeats scheduled), be sure to tune in to KRCB (Channel 22) at 12:30 PM, Saturday, March 5, to see your friends from the guild being interviewed along with an inspiring story about Quilts of Valor. You may even be motivated to make a donation to your local PBS station.

Kim Fauth April 2016

Kim Schrader Fauth has been teaching quilt classes for approximately ten years but has been quilting for over thirty years. When she came up with the new ABCD Technique, she shared it with her Monday quilting group, they strongly encouraged her to write





a book because the technique was so new and different.

This is the first quilt ever made using the ABCD Technique.

The book uses three fabrics cut into any size squares. The ABCD Blocks system takes three hours to make all 32 blocks.

April 21 Program Kim will present a trunk show, **"ABCD Quilting Magic: How to Make the Blocks and Design**." The blocks look complicated because they have parallelograms and trapezoids in addition to triangles.

<u>April 22 Workshop</u> Kim will present "ABCD Quilting - 32 Blocks in 3 hours." Please visit her website to see samples of the possible quilts; especially under the "students" heading.

"Fusing/Fabric Painting to Create an Art Quilt"

In this lecture Lenore will talk about how she has evolved from using other art media to using her own fusing technique with fabric paint to create art quilts with depth and color from photographs she has taken in her travels. She will tell us how she creates a piece from beginning to end and give secrets she has learned on how to make your design a winner. Lenore has won prizes with this new style of art quilting, such as the Best Wall Quilt at the 2007 AQS Nashville Show and the 2011 Moda Best Wall Quilt at the AQS Show in Paducah for "Port of Cassis" now residing at the National Quilt Museum in Paducah, KY. She recently received "Best Art Quilt" award in 2016 at Road to California.

May 20 Workshop

Fusing and Fabric Painting to Create a Realistic Art Quilt

Let your inner artist come out and play in this workshop with Lenore Crawford and create a beautiful quilted piece by fusing and painting some special flowers.

In this workshop, we will begin to design a small fused project. We will work from one of Lenore's patterns shown on the <u>Patterns</u> page of her website: Yellow Poppies, Red Poppies,



Yellow Cone Flower, Cone Flower or Rose, since these are the least complex patterns for beginners. The pattern will be outlined on freezer paper and then transferred to a background fabric on which the design will be fused. No sewing will be

- 2 hand knitted dish cloths
- 13 potholders

Not all of the quilts made it to our guild's Show and Tell, as we opted to have them delivered to Lake County as soon as they were done. I do believe we captured pictures of all at some point.

Any quilts finished after Quilt Fest that were considered Lap size or smaller were not delivered to Lake County. There were other guilds that donated this size quilt so we opted to keep ours and donated them to Community Quilts to jump start the year.

Not to sound like a broken record, but thanks again to Betty Upchurch for not only quilting over 30 quilts herself *and* making some quilt delivery trips up to Lake County, and to all the rest of you sweet quilting souls who made tops, quilted, bound, labeled etc. and made pillowcases, dish cloths and potholders.

With the experience I gained along with the willingness and response for the this type of project made me realize that we could actually be better prepared the next time a disaster occurs. Of course I'm hoping that preparedness means never needing to put it into action. I am willing to take this on, unless someone else feels it is their destiny to lead an informal project like this. Rob Appell Workshop

When Rob was booked last year, by intuition alone I knew he was going to be good... As many of you know I am a bit of a technophobe. I don't like the "interwebs" or DVDs because they take time away



from sewing! I didn't look him up, even once. When he arrived at the Scottish Rite Center it was raining cats and dogs. He was toting a suitcase on wheels the size of a speaker box from a rock concert. His smile was big and bright and filled the room. He was **on** and his

program rocked a full house.

Ordinarily, my essays revolve around workshops but there are several things that must be noted from his program, 'Quilts From the Sea and Beyond,' which weaves his personal story into the show. He has given a large portion of his enthusiasm and talent to charity. I recommend a look at his website at www.mansewing.com. Check out 'The Endangered Species Quilt Project' and 'Operation Home Front.' Also, he has sewing tutorials on YouTube using the channel 'Man Sewing.' He also works with The Missouri Star Quilt Company where all of his fabulous merchandise can be found. Check out their website at www.missouriguiltco.com. Lastly, on the back of his patterns with the copyright information is this (and I love it): "Anything you make using our patterns or ideas is your business, do whatever you want with the stuff you make, it's yours!"

A system of heavy showers with intermittent sunshine set the stage for a lovely, cozy, warm, and fun day. 8:30 arrival for set up made for a timely start. We gathered around Rob and he began teaching. After 45 minutes of instruction on strata building and color we began our own strata processes. One fun thing about workshops is the array of materials and color choices. My tablemate, Fran, brought dark rich reproduction prints. The majority of the students brought bright or pastel rainbow prints and solids, all gorgeous. While the class built strata Rob went around the room attending each person, sometimes stopping to share a story or important information. Rob's teaching style is similar to what one sees at his Trunk Show but the Rob we had on Friday - while still guite talkative - was more relaxed,

though still "**on**." He had our undivided attention and 6 hours (plus lunch) to get the strata constructed and designed.

Laurie and Melanie came from Walnut Creek. Lori P. came from Redwood Valley. Moonlighter Barbara was there. Also present was a Cloverdale contingent, Linda and Jeanie. Current SRQG President Jim "Cat Daddy" Jensen was there. Valerie not only participated in Show and Tell for the first time at the Program meeting but she attended her first workshop with us as well. I believe she thrived in this friendly and helpful environment. Keep an eye out for Valerie - her work is good. I see a contender at the Sonoma County Fair this summer. When Phyllis is present I feel a sense of calm. She is adept in sewing skills and tips and tricks, plus has a plethora of knowledge - and she picks up lunch for me.

A full tummy fuels the afternoon. Rob calls us to-

gether again for more instruction. The last three strip sets are mixed up size-wise to jazz things up in a syncopated fashion. Once the strata are constructed it's time to design. I do hope photographs were taken. As the day



progressed, six strata sets per person were placed on the design walls. With 25 students the room was festooned with so many bright colors it looked like a Gay Pride Parade. I hope Rob is impressed with us. We are a remarkably wonderful group.

Thank you to the set-up team in the morning and the take down crew in the afternoon, and to those who schlepped ironing boards, irons, and electrical cords, and to the lunch runners and the garbage gatherers. We are grateful for the effort and energy that makes these Santa Rosa Quilt Guild Programs and Workshops so phenomenal. Rob is a good man, a good teacher, and totes adorbs. We are blessed to have his attention, instruction, and new faboo techniques

to build beautiful quilts. Just to show you how impressed I am, I am going to subscribe to 'Man Sewing' for my 10year-old grandson, Gino, so that when we sew together, Rob will be the teacher.
