#### AUGUST PROGRAM

#### LECTURE ~ "SETS EDUCATION"

We are fortunate to have Sharyn Craig on August 16 with her program "Sets Education," based on her book *Setting Solutions*. While we look at lots of quilts, Sharyn will discuss problem blocks and their quilt solutions as she reviews sections from her book, concentrating on Size Reconciliation, Color Correction, Corner Cutters, and Dare to be Different. Her name may be familiar to many of you who have seen her books and articles in many magazines, including *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine, Quilting Today* and *American Quilter*. Her specialty is to encourage creativity, and she contributes to the Design Challenge column in *Traditional Quiltworks*.



#### WORKSHOP ~ "THE JOY OF SETS"



Many of you have already signed up for her August 17 workshop, "The Joy of Sets," a non-sewing workshop - bring blocks and prepare to have fun while everyone is encouraged to help design setting options. 


# technique sharing workshops

# library news

When I drove into the parking lot for our meeting the day after the Fourth of July I was greeted by a quilting visitor from Eureka, Linda King, her guild's new librarian. She had read in my Library report on our guild's website that I try to get to guild meetings by 9:15 to unlock the doors, and she thought that would be a good time to catch me to chat about how a guild library works. She was immediately put to work while I showed her the nooks and crannies where we store our over 1.850 books. It is just amazing to me how our world has shrunk with the help of the internet. Yes, sometimes while working with the computer it seems to me that I am at the keyboard more than my sewing machine, but the new technologies have made it faster and easier to get information to lots of people. Linda requested a copy of an article I had published in "American Quilter's Society" magazine about how to get a quilt guild library started. While e-mailing the notes to Linda on July 16, 2007, I noticed that I had spoken to the NCQC about "What Makes Your Guild Great" that generated that article on July 16, 1997 - EX-ACTLY ten years ago that very day. I am still shaking my head at that coincidence. And I am amazed that it has been ten years since I had my first magazine article published. While reading the article I was reminded how many things have changed, such as: we now have a laptop computer (thanks to Jan Andrews) to help find information about the books we own, we have pretty labels (thanks to Linda Hooper who designed and printed them) to help us spot our books quickly, we now file our books by categories, we now can read our guild newsletter on the computer (thanks to Angie Kiker and Jan Andrews), we can see on our website Sew and Tell photos that are taken digitally at meetings and events (thanks to Joanie Bellinghausen), and we have added 1000 books to our stacks (thanks to many generous people who support our guild through the Silent Auction Tables and the 50/50 drawing, and all of the volunteers to work to help organize the library). I wonder what the next ten years will bring . . .



Here are our newest books:

Joen Wolfrom has written nearly a dozen books, but her newest, VISUAL COLORING – A FOOLPROOF AP-PROACH TO COLOR-RICH QUILTS is my



favorite, and I am putting a star (\*) next to it on my library book list. Color wheels are not discussed in this text. Instead, choose a favorite photo or piece of fabric and pull the colors for your quilt from that. Joen takes us through seven samples, starting with the photo, choosing the fabrics, and the end result. She enlisted her quilting friends (and some of their friends) to make quilts from photos she chose. It is very interesting to see the results of the challenge. Three projects in the back of the book show us step-by-step how to use a particular photo, choose the fabrics, and make the project. Even if you do not wish to use her method, do check out the book to enjoy the photography and the magnificent quilts.

A book called MYSTERY QUILTS by Rita Fishel was a no-brainer for me to purchase. I am putting our dear Melissa Trunick, our Guild Queen of Mystery Quilts, first on the Reserve List. She may just decide to keep the book hidden from the rest of us while she is inspired to create more Mystery Quilting Days for us. The results from Melissa's Mystery Quilts are always astounding. If you can use a rotary cutter and a sewing machine, then you are ready for Melissa's fun challenges.

When Alex Anderson (former host of the very popular HGTV show SIMPLY QUILTS) was asked to write a book on MACHINE QUILTING – 7 EXER-CISES, PROJECTS & FULL-SIZE QUILTING PAT-TERNS she hesitated as she did not think she was "expert" enough. Maybe that is why this book is so wonderful – it will not intimidate beginning machine quilters. Here I quote Alex: "Although I had learned to machine quilt about fifteen years earlier, I still found it a bit of a challenge ... to say the least! Then, about three years ago, I woke up in the middle of the night and decided I was being foolish. I

got up from the bed and promptly held a serious meeting with me, myself, and I. I realized that my lack of confidence in machine quilting was all in my head. I could do it!" If that doesn't get you to put your name on the Reserve List, then just look at the book to see Alex's pretty quilts, and her hints that you glance at along the way will be most helpful to all who quilt, whether by machine or hand.

Peggy Martin has written a second book about foundation piecing: PAPER PIECING THE QUICK-STRIP WAY – 12 COMPLETE PROJECTS, CRE-ATE YOUR OWN DESIGNS, PAPER PIECE FASTER! Her stars, medallions, and borders are fantastic, and look very difficult to create, and she shares all the secrets with us – but her snowflakes are absolutely breathtaking! Even if you do not care to paper piece, the color combinations of the quilts are spectacular. Check it out!

When I purchased the QUILTERS' TRAVEL COM-PANION - 9<sup>th</sup> EDITION 2006-2008, I subscribed to their semi-annual "Up-To-Date Newsletter" which lists shops that have moved or closed, plus new shops that have opened since the book was printed. If you are going to be traveling be sure to check out this reference book for addresses where you can get your quilt shop fix while on the road. I will staple the newsletter inside the front cover of the book. Just in time for summer reading is the third in the Shenandoah Album Novels TOUCHING STARS by Emilie Richards. As some of the characters are developed in her first two novels, I do recommend that you read them before this newest book.

Our Library continues to grow with the help of so many, and my thanks to all of you!

ell, not really my first *quilt*, more like my first *quilting*.

In 1989, after my parents had died, I was going through their things and I found a completed "Double Wedding Ring" quilt top. What a find, for I had no idea it existed! (Years later, while reading my paternal grandmother's dairies, I learned that she had made it for my mother in 1940.)

Since I already had the quilt top, I only needed to quilt it, right? What I knew about guilting was that I would need a batting, a backing fabric and a



frame. So I ordered a frame (not a very expensive one) from Penney's, bought a fat polyester batting and found an old white muslin sheet in the linen closet. I basted the sandwich, put it on the frame and, with needle in hand tried to make little stitches following some markings I had put on with yellow tailor's chalk. What *else* could I have done wrong? First the needle would not go through that thick arrangement – and though I struggled and struggled, I finally had to quit and take it off the frame. I hauled the big mass to the local quilt shop in San Rafael and showed it to the owner, Susan Bradford. I thought she was going to cry. She looked at what I had done to that beautifully and pieced quilt top and immediately came to my rescue.

First she selected a thin, all cotton batt that was traditional for quilts made in the thirties and forties.

She chose a *light weight* bleached muslin, the common backing in that era. Then she signed me up for a couple of hand quilting classes.

The sandwich was dismantled and I started again. And, although the quilt looks pretty good, the yellow tailor's chalk markings remain to this day on the upper right hand block as a reminder of my first effort at quilting! There was no removing that stuff!

Lots of lessons learned here.
