## programs and workshops

In April our speaker/ teacher will be Tracy Brookshier. Tracy's quilts and her lecture/trunk show—*Brave Use of Color* will be visually exciting as well as broadening our ideas about color in our quilts. Tracey is a quilt artist, pattern designer, teacher, and quilt judge who began her quilting career seriously in 1993. On Friday, in her workshop, *Baskets*, Tracy will show us how to take a traditional pattern and make it spectacular. The pattern lends itself to fabrics from batiks to classic reproductions. This is a great class for beginners!

“Dyeing to Tell You” with Joy Lily will be our informative presentation in May. Joy’s talk and slide show will cover many topics related to dyes and colors as well as “sex, drugs, food, and good books”. The workshop, Shihbori Scarf Dyeing, on Friday will explore Arashi shibori—pole wrapping—the Japanese grandmother of tie-dyeing—to fold, wrap and dye multiple colors making white silk scarves into fabulous colorful wearable art. You may also bring your own cottons to shibori dye for quilting! All materials are provided for this class.

## santa rosa quilt guild library

Our guild library continues to grow with the assistance and donations of numerous members. Volunteers are always needed for a variety of tasks. If you have a few extra minutes before or after the meeting, we will find a project for you. Your pay is meeting more guild members and finding books to take home to read.

In last month's Newsletter I wrote how I had added our recent speaker Cara Gulati to my list of all-time favorite entertainers at our guild. Just one month later I very happily added another speaker to my list of greats - Cynthia England. Cynthia brought along her magnificent quilt that was named one of the 100 best of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, AND donated an autographed copy of her very special book **PICTURE PIECING** to our library. Cynthia very generously explains the secrets of her special foundation piecing in her tip-filled book.



Phyllis Gallaway caught sight of Judy Martin's newest book, very appropriately titled **KNOCKOUT BLOCKS AND SAMPLER QUILTS**. This is one of the books that you may wish to purchase for your own personal library to refer back to again and again. Judy has included 109 block patterns (98 never-before-published), each with at least two color variations, which I find most helpful. Also included are nine sampler quilt patterns, and 34 other quilt plans. In the back of the book are over a dozen pages of charts including such facts as bed dimensions, how many patches can be cut from a yard of fabric, and lots more. I want to know what the author's "drug of choice" is as I am certain she never sleeps! What a treasure she is.

It is never, ever too early to start thinking about Christmas, so check out **DEBBIE MUMM'S DECORATING WITH QUICK & EASY HOLIDAY QUILTS**. See rooms photographed full of wall quilts, stockings, an angel tree topper that will not break when the cats tip over the tree, an elegant table runner, "merry mittens flatware holders" that would be darling for the kids in your family, throw pillows, bed pillowcases, and of course, ornaments, plus lots more. Get a start on those gifts and decorations now. Maybe you will want to try out some of those ideas to make for our guild's boutique fundraiser, which helps to bring us those incredible speakers.

Nancy Johnson-Srebro has written a book recommended to us by Phyllis Gallaway: **STARS BY MAGIC - NEW SUPER-EASY TECHNIQUE! DIAMOND-FREE STARS FROM SQUARES & RECTANGLES! PERFECT POINTS AND NO Y-SEAMS**. The title says it all! This would be another excellent book for inspiration for Friendship Blocks!

Indian Orange Peel, Pine Burr, An Unusual Lone Star, Clamshells, Lady Liberty Goes to Hawaii, Happy Rick-Rack, Terns & Ferns, Yardbirds Circling the Cat, Rattlesnake, Delirious, Summer Star, Mississippi Wheel of Fortune, and Cinco de Mayo - those are the patterns included in the **KAREN K. STONE QUILTS** book. Karen's quilts are terrific to look at, and can certainly be constructed by anyone who will study her book. I think the very best part of this book is the lesson in choosing the fabrics for her award-winning quilts. Some techniques included are foundation piecing, applique (fusible), embellishment, and Karen's feelings about quilting. There are so many terrific things I could say about this book, but not enough space, so get on the Reserve List and check it out and see for yourself!

Teddy Bear Quilts has donated **SUNBONNET SUE'S JOYFUL CHRISTMAS**, a redwork book by Pearl Louise Krush. I especially like the Sue Treetop Angel and the ornaments.

Carol Doak has compiled a buffet of new patterns for us in her **300 PAPER-PIECED QUILT BLOCKS**. This includes a CD enabling us to easily print her patterns from our computers. If anyone would like to practice paper-piecing, there are adorable patterns for houses, trucks, ducks, flowers, hearts, trees, and many more, that would make great blocks for the King-size library quilt that our guild, under the direction of Lee Trevelyan, is making for children to sit upon during story hours.

Esther Alton and Evelyn Hensley both suggested I obtain **FINISH IT WITH ALEX ANDERSON**. Alex illustrates borders with miters, scallops, and prairie points, and discusses ideas to coordinate borders, bindings, and edge treatments for the center of your quilts, as well as giving us directions for six quilts. If you are partial to butterflies, see her charming scrappy quilt with fused and buttonholed butterfly bodies.

If you are planning to travel in California, Nevada, Oregon, and/or Washington State, check out **THE QUILTERS PATH**. This little book is appropriate for February, March, and April 2005. It contains information of quilting events, activities, and shopping. Our guild even is mentioned.

All members appreciate when books are returned on a timely basis (that means, the very next meeting). And we also find that if you wear your nametag we learn your name more quickly!

## *an interview with fran wessel*

Weed, CA is a small timber logging town near the Sierra where Fran was born. In her early childhood she loved riding horses. She entered competitions in a sport called barrel racing and won several blue ribbons. Her Aunt Betty was her mentor, her idol. Fran joyfully remembers the day Aunt Betty bought her a pair of authentic English riding pants. Fran and her husband have two children, one grandchild and one great grandchild residing in Olympia, WA.

Prior to Fran's newly acquired obsession with quilting she claims to have been unaware of her artistic talent. Yet it is evident in all her quilt projects. It was such a delight seeing her use of colors and creative design. I was particularly impressed with her intuitive placement and kinds of embellishments used on her quilts. After learning to quilt, Fran dropped her former concept that quilting was about "bed coverings". She also was inspired to free-up from following rules. "I can now do what's in my heart and thoughts". She now feels very creative. Following patterns is simply not her forte! Her inspirations come from selecting fabrics, sketching her own ideas and the possibility of stories it all may represent. Oh, did I tell you what impresses her the most in the process of quilting? Fran said, "having my machine not make thread nests and doing projects my own way"!

My last question was how she would like to be remembered. She said, "as a caring, upbeat, humorous person. Also I hope my work will inspire others". I for one will purely feel that way! Thank you kindly for being so open and sharing Fran. I appreciated your allowing me to interview you. You are an inspiration!

## *pre-washing fabrics*

As with so much in quilting, there are two sides to many subjects (cut or tear fabric?, steam or dry iron?, press seams open or to one side?). I would like for you to know why I think it is so important to pre-wash and machine dry fabrics.

New fabric is very exciting to all quilters, whether it is yardage purchased at a favorite shop, or fabric and blocks we exchange at guild meetings. My excitement dwindles quickly when I examine fabrics that I bring home from guild exchanges and find the fabrics have not been pre-washed.

Even though the person who donates the fabrics for the exchanges may create pieces that are never intended for laundering, I would hope that they would realize that other quilters may launder their projects and do not want any surprises in the way the fabrics react. Many years ago I attended a class where we shared fabrics. I made the most wonderful miniature quilt with quarter-inch finished pieces. I marked the quilt top for hand quilting. When I spritzed the quilting marks off the completed piece I was sickened when the colors ran into one another ruining the project. I was taught a very valuable lesson that day. Please pre-wash your fabrics.

I hope that you will consider these thoughts in the future.

P. S. Don't forget the Fabric Exchange at the first meeting of the month!

1. Good quality 100% cotton, *pre-washed* fabric
2. Perfectly cut 6-inch squares
3. Place the nine squares into a baggie marked with your name. If you wish to participate in the raffle, include a tenth square.
4. Theme Fabrics: April = Flowers, May=Cooking, June=Bugs

## community quilts

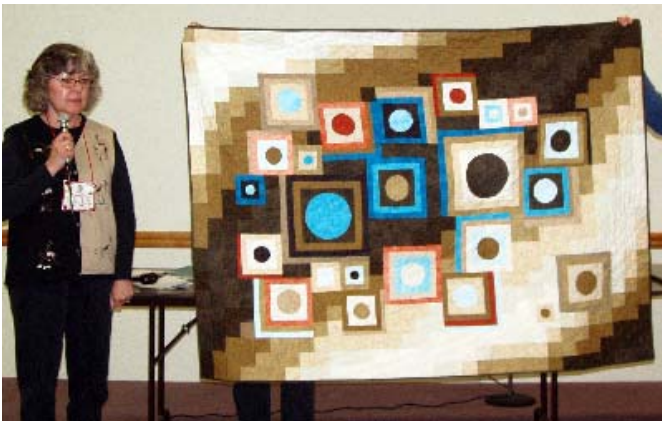
