

Is it time to become inspired? Quilting inspirations come from one's senses.


"Meet the Teachers" is an opportunity to hear quilting and wearable artists introduce themselves with a short presentation. Afterwards, each will have a display showing their work.

Northern California Quilt Council Grant Application Guidelines and Requirements

The purpose of the Northern California Quilt Council is to facilitate communication among quilt groups, among shop owners, to coordinate a master calendar of quilting events, to provide a forum for discussing common concerns and new ideas, and to share information thru speakers, workshops, shows, etc. dedicated to promoting quilting. As required by law, the property of this organization is dedicated to charitable purposes and no part of the assets shall be given for the benefit of any director, officer, member, or any private person.

Requirements:

- 1. All grant requests to be considered much be postmarked on or before **October**
- **1**. Grant applications postmarked or received after the deadline will not be considered.
- 2. The grant application form must be fully completed and all attachments must accompany the grant application.
- 3. Clearly describe the purpose of your organization and how the grant will assist in meeting its purpose.
- 4. Fully describe how the funds will be used. Include a budget showing all funds that will be used for this grant.
- 5. All grant awards are at the discretion of the Directors of NCQC.

Northern California Quilt Council Information for Guild Representatives

NCQC is in existence to assist local guilds in promoting quilting and membership in guilds and to encourage participation in activities with NCQC. This document is presented to assist local guild representatives in informing their guild members about the purposes and opportunities of NCQC. This information may be shared with all members of the guild.

NCQC would like each guild representative to:

- 1. Attend each quarterly meeting or send a substitute. Attendance is taken at each meeting and it is very important that your guild is represented. Also information for each guild is provided at each meeting. Be sure to pick up the materials for your guild and take it back to the appropriate officers and/or members.
- 2. Bring your opportunity quilt to help increase sales. Opportunity quilts may be displayed and tickets sold at each meeting except during the Meet the Teachers meetings because it becomes too crowded.
- 3. Visit the NCQC website for up to date information on meetings and speakers. You may copy anything of interest on the web site and share the information with your members. Share with your members about how to use the NCQC web site and the information on it including shop directory, events calendar, membership directory, meeting topics, directions to meetings, etc.
- 4. Give a brief summary of the NCQC meetings you attend during your board and regular guild meetings. Also inform your membership about future topics at the NCQC meetings. Strive to energize your guild about the benefits of NCQC to individual members as well as the guild as a whole and get them interested in attending.
- 5. Suggest a car pool of members attend the meetings. Plan a fun trip with a visit to various quilt shops in the area and pick an interesting and/or new place for lunch.
- 6. Get to know the members of the NCQC board. Make suggestions for topics you or your guild would like to see offered. Ask board members for ideas for getting your guild to

- more actively participate in NCQC activities.
- 7. Inform NCQC Membership secretary immediately of any change in the information regarding your guild. This information is shared with many people and posted on the web site. Keeping the local guild information current is the responsibility of the guild representative.
- 8. Notify NCQC of your guild events including guild name, event name, dates, open times, location with directions, and contact person with phone number and/or email or web page. This is a wonderful avenue for advertising your events.

The role of the Guild Representative is a very important one because of the many groups and people who count on current information about your guild. The more you participate, the more your guild will benefit. Your role is a major contribution to the promotion of quilting in our region and NCQC is very appreciative of all you do. Below is a paragraph you may wish to put in your newsletter. Again, thank you for all your efforts in representing your quilt guild.
