Judy became interested in quiltmaking in 1973 while completing a BS degree in Home Economics (Textiles and Clothing) at California State University, Northridge. She lectures and conducts workshops throughout the United States, and has worked in Canada, Japan, Australia, Scotland, New Zealand and England. She is certified by the National Quilt Association as a Judge. Her work has won numerous prizes at Houston Quilt Festival, Pacific International Quilt Festival, Quilt National, Visions, NQA, and many other shows. Mariner's compass quilt designs and their many variations are Judy's specialties.

Workshop January 16, 2009 ~ "Mariners Compass – Split to the Center"

Learn to draft and piece these exciting radiating stars (mariner's compass type) into circles, ovals or off center circles. Draft your own formal symmetrical star into nearly any shape and size, create a flashy off center star or select a pattern from Judy's book of the above title. Designs will be drafted on foundations to simplify the piecing process. Use of color as well as precision points will be covered.

The workshop will be held at Luther Burbank Art & Garden Center, 2050 Yulupa Ave., Santa Rosa.


community quilts



It could not function without the dozens of people who assist, the donations made to the Silent Auction Table to help raise funds to buy books, along with the 50/50 tickets purchased. Once again, the library not only did not have to take funds from the guild budget, but the library actually put money in the guild's general account!


CRAZY SHORTCUT QUILTS – QUILT AS YOU GO AND FINISH IN HALF THE TIME! by Marguerita McManus and Sarah Raffuse – Combine layers of a quilt in small, manageable sections, which requires virtually no precise measuring and cutting. Been itching to try all of those special stitches on your sewing machine? This is the perfect project to experiment.

SKINNY QUILTS & TABLE RUNNERS – FROM TO-DAY'S TOP DESIGNERS edited by Eleanor Levie – 15 projects from such quilters as Kaffe Fassett, Yvonne Porcella, Jane Sassaman, Laura Wasilowski (the fusing Queen), Karen Eckmeier (known for her "houses on a hill" book), and one of my favorites, Carol Taylor. Many different techniques to choose from.

IT'S A WRAP – SEWING FABRIC PURSES, BASKETS, AND BOWLS by Susan Breier – Pat Marabella is credited with introducing us to this book after showing the wonderful baskets she has been creating. Wrap some clothesline with cotton fabrics then head for your sewing machine and zig zag away. This book shows tons of ideas.

SNUGGLE-AND-LEARN QUILTS FOR KIDS by Chris Lynn Kirsch – Teach numbers, colors, words, textures. Even instructions for a portable roll-up CHALKBOARD! Think Community Quilts!!

SCRAPS & SHIRTTAILS: REUSE, RE-PURPOSE, RECYCLE! – THE ART OF "QUILTING GREEN" by Bonnie K. Hunter – Jan Andrews donated this brand new book for our library, and I like it so much I am adding a * next to the title on our library list. The author has a great way of putting colors together.



SIMPLE TO SENSATIONAL BATIKS by Nancy Smith and Lynda Milligan – Start at the beginning with easy squares and straight seams, then move through the 13 projects learning applique, paper piecing, half-square triangle units, and curved seams. Something for everyone.

EASY APPLIQUE SAMPLERS – 20 DESIGNS TO MIX AND MATCH by Mimi Dietrich – Recommended by Melissa Trunick – The author is a master at hand appliqué, but these can also be done with fusibles and machine appliqué. Find adorable patterns for an angel, an apple, a birthday cake, a flag, and many more.

THE QUILTING ARTS BOOK – TECHNIQUES AND INSPIRATION FOR CREATING ONE-OF-A-KIND QUILTS by Patricia Bolton – You will recognize the author as the editor of "Quilting Arts Magazine" and the host of "Quilting Arts TV." Some of the techniques have been included in the magazine, others are brand new to us. Linda Schmidt, our guild speaker in August, writes about adding puff paints to quilts (and more).

EMBELLISHED MINI QUILTS – CREATIVE LITTLE WORKS OF ART by Jamie Fingal – between this and the previously mentioned book, you will never run out of ideas to decorate and enhance your quilts. Nothing will be safe – your old jewelry, ribbons, seashells, hardware items – they could all end up on quilts.

QUILTS IN MY CUBICLE by Barbara Holtzman – The author wanted to decorate her office with a different small quilt each month. They are small enough to make use of fat quarters.

LET'S MAKE WAVES by Lily Marie Amaru (the "significant other" of Genie Becker's brother) – Lily visited our guild recently and will be a speaker next Spring. Get a headstart by taking a look at the book she donated that uses the "wave" ruler she designed.

UNCOVERINGS 2008, Volume 29 of the Research Papers of the American Quilt Study Group – free every year with our dues to the group – In-depth historical studies.

DESIGN EXPLORATIONS FOR THE CREATIVE QUILTER – Easy-to-follow lessons for dynamic art quilts by Katie Pasquini Masopust.

SILK UNRAVELED – experiments in tearing, fusing, layering & stitching by Lorna Moffat.

QUILTING UFOs WITH HELEN'S HINTS by Helen Squire – For every project that needs to be quilted, answer her four questions. TONS of tips.

YOU'RE INVITED! QUILTS AND HOMES TO INSPIRE by Barb Adams and Alma Allen.

SWEET INSPIRATIONS by Pam Manning - use one of the folk art designs in a project, or combine them all into a quilt.

AS THE CROW FLIES by Edie McGinnis – primitive crows, sunflowers, pineapples, and more – use singly or put all into a quilt.

FAST, FUN 7 EASY FABRIC DYEING – CREATE COLORFUL FABRIC FOR QUILTS, CRAFTS & WEARABLES by Lynn Koolish – One of the best dyeing books I have encountered – even I may be able to be successful with these instructions.

AMERICAN JANE'S QUILTS FOR ALL SEASONS . . . AND SOME FOR NO REASON BY Sandy Klop – Scotty dogs, hearts, dancing girls, scraps, bright colors – something for everyone.

LOOSE CHANGE – QUILTS FROM NICKELS, DIMES, AND FAT QUARTERS by Claudia Plett and Le Ann Weaver – when they talk about "nickels" they mean five-inch squares, "dimes" are the 10-inch squares – table runners, crib, lap, and bed quilts – traditional and foundation piecing, appliqué, embroidery.

DIGITAL ESSENTIALS - THE QUILT MAKER'S MUST-HAVE GUIDE TO IMAGES, FILES, AND MORE! by Gloria Hansen (the woman who put our website together!) - I sneaked this book to Linda Hooper, who manages our website for us, and who has, in my estimation, a Ph.D. in computer "stuff." The following is Linda's review for us: "This book is not about quilting, it is about digital pictures and how to manipulate your images on the computer to make them look better. This might interest quilters because we take pictures of our guilts to send over the Internet or print from our home PC's. In order to understand this book, you need to be somewhat computer savvy and have a little knowledge about editing photos. Although this book has a lot of good information, I think it might be too involved for someone just looking for some simple advice on how to lighten or crop a photo or prepare it for sending over the web. However, if you are already using a program like Photoshop, Photoshop Elements, or Paint Shop Pro and would like some more detailed information on how these programs operate in regard to photo editing, then this book is for you." And I agree 100% with Linda – this book is totally beyond me, but I am glad we have it in our library for those with more computer experience.

PRECIOUS SUNBONNET QUILTS by Betty Alderman – Esther Alton suggested this charming book for our library. Sunbonnet Sues have been introduced to the 21st century. This is a good book for Redwork stitchers, as well as appliquers of all types.


