#### JANUARY PROGRAM

#### **LECTURE & WORKSHOP:**

You won't want to miss Dale Fleming on January 18th for "Inspiration into Art." Her trunk and slide show document her approach to designing a quilt. Dale is an award-winning quilter, who has appeared on Simply Quilts. Her book *Pieced Curves So Simple*, is in great demand. Her methods allow quilters to expand their skills as they explore new possibilities. In her workshop on Friday January 19, The Six-Minute Circle and So Much More, we will learn how to machine piece a circle into a background using the pinless piecing method featured in her book. This method is versatile enough that even a first timer will be suc-

Get ready for a treat on February 15th when Philomena Durcan presents "Celts and Their Art." Philomena is an winning quilter award and author of several books, including Celtic Quilt Designs (under the name of Philomena Wiechec), Celtic Spirals, A Celtic Garden and Celtic Quilt Designs II.



Stop in at her websitet <u>www.celticquilts.com</u> to see a gallery of her work, specializing in Celtic interlace, combined with applique.

The workshop on Friday, February 16th is "Celtic Anemone." The class project is a floral appliqué wallhanging of three anemone blossoms with a Celtic interlace frame. We will learn to make two sizes of bias tape - a very narrow one which is used to outline each



piece of appliqué fabric in the three anemone blossoms, and a wide one which is used in the interlace frame. We will learn how to use colors and shades to bring a 3-dimensional ap-

pearance to the blossoms. We will learn both the appliqué technique and the interlace technique, which may be applied to many projects. Although Philomena focuses on handwork, this method may be adapted to machine sewing for the bias tape. This is a wonderful opportunity to do some exquisite appliqué without worrying about turning the edges or sewing a satin stitch.

## sew a row program

We are gearing up for another great year for the Sew-A-Row Program. If you attended our Christmas Luncheon on December 7th, you got to see how these fun projects turned out. From the simplest to the most intricate design, there is something for everyone in the Sew-A-Rows.

I will be accepting starter rows up until the second meeting in January (I'll be absent, but will have someone to collect your rows.) Sew-A-Rows may be whatever size you desire, but no larger than 36" wide. Mini's at 12" or 14" are great, too. If you submit a starter row, you need not add to any others unless you want to, and you don't need to put in a starter row to play! The more the merrier!!

Each cycle will allow you two months to complete your addition to the project and you are not limited to adding your row to the bottom of the existing quiltlet. Rows may be added to the top, bottom or any place in the middle that suits your design vision.

With her newest book FREE & EASY CIRCLES find out how she jokes about "Magic Ballz." The bright colorz she usez along with her quick and eazy techniquez guaranteez smilez!

I cannot say it any better than the back cover of Sandra Meech's CREATIVE QUILTS – IN-SPIRATION, TEXTURE, STITCH, so I will quote: "Use art, architecture and world textiles as a source for quilt design;" "new surface embellishment and mixed-media techniques plus working in three dimensions;" "practical exercises to help you reach the highest level of creativity, plus information on how to exhibit your work;" "illustrated throughout with glorious work from the world's finest quilt artists." Use her ideas to make your very own covered sketchbook to record your ideas in.

Ohhhh - I like this quoting business, and since I am writing this with visions of sugarplums in my head, I think I will "cheat" and use another quote. About her newest book. Jan Andrews has donated an autographed copy of Ami Simm's FUN PHOTO-QUILTS & CRAFTS. Ami shares her secrets for choosing appropriate photos, transferring them onto fabric, and incorporating them into traditional quilt blocks. Thanks, Jan, for sharing with us!

QUILTS – MORE WAYS TO STACK THE DECK. She repeats the basic directions for stacking, slicing, and shuffling fabrics, and gives us seventeen new projects to try.

Being a vegetable lover, I could not resist Bea Oglesby's VEGGIES FROM THE GOOD EARTH – APPLIQUE ALBUM. Patterns for old favorites (carrots, corn-on-the-cob, and tomatoes) are joined by the more exotic kohlrabi, okra, AND a 77-piece artichoke. Make just one block, or combine several for a tablerunner, or make a delicious stew to hang on the wall. Even though the author specializes in hand applique, I will bet we could cheat with fusibles! Gee – maybe this could be my next Friendship quilt that you all can help me create!!!

A New Year means that I am going to reorganize our library books. If you would like to assist in schlepping stacks of books from here to there, I can always use all the help I can get. By mid-January free tours of the library shelves will be offered.

# block of the month

All Guild members are invited to join in our Blockof-the-Month this year starting in January! Our

2007 theme is "Stars over Santa Rosa". Each month directions for a different 12-1/2 inch pieced block with star motif will be available at the first Guild business meeting and the pattern will be posted on our website. Sewn blocks are due at the next months business meeting in the BOM Basket, with your

name attached to the block. Please sign the BOM Log with the number of blocks you are returning. It is suggested you sew three blocks of the pattern -- one for the drawing -- one for the community quilt -- one for your own quilt of stars. You will find sewing three is almost as easy as one!

The first month will be "Crystal Star", a variation on the traditional Ohio Star pattern similar to the diagram. For our exchange drawing, make the Crystal Star in fabrics of pale blue, light blue, and deep blue in icy, silver or metallic cotton fabrics of quilt store quality. For the community quilt and your own quilt choose similar colors perhaps in the suggested fabrics or star prints or batik fabrics or solids. Sew the star pattern every month and by the end of the year you will have a galaxy of stars quilt!
