


JUNE

I love when our members (and/or their friends and relatives) plunge into Spring cleaning and bring items in for either our library shelves or to raise funds on our Silent Auction Tables. We are the lucky recipients of a really cute book QUICK QUILTS FOR KIDS – 20 COLORFUL PROJECTS FOR BABIES AND CHILDREN by Elizabeth



Keevill. When I was a kid my Mom hung her bag for organizing shoes on the back of the closet door. I loved taking her shoes out and putting my toys in the pockets. In this book is a pattern for an adorable wall hanging pocket! All kids (and even adults) could use one of these.

Also donated is an oldie-but-goodie: BUT-TERFLIES by Nancy Donahue. This book alone could be the inspiration for blocks in our Friendship program that Linda Hooper is heading up this year.

Ionne McCauley and Sharon Pederson have teamed up to bring us COLOR FOR THE TERRIFIED QUILTER – PLAIN TALK, SIMPLE LESSONS, 11 PROJECTS. The titles of the chapters and the quilts are enough to get you interested in reading the book.

Angie Kiker has recommended Nicole C. Chambers' newest book SIMPLE QUILTS THAT LOOK LIKE A MILLION BUCKS. It is amazing how with the right choice of colors and an easy block can be made into something spectacular.

If you read Quilter's Newsletter Magazine you are familiar with Helen Kelley. For close to 25 years she has been the "Erma Bombeck" of the quilting world with her monthly column "Loose Threads". We have a donation of her essays entitled EVERY QUILT TELLS A STORY – A QUILTER'S STASH OF WIT AND WISDOM. These two- or three-page "stories" are what each of us thinks as we create quilts, and would be the thoughts we would write down if we took the time.

For the last dozen or so years American Quilter's Society has sponsored a contest open to everyone. The challenge is to create a quilt from a traditional block in a new way. The winners and their guilts are featured in a book each year (and we have them ALL!). Joining such titles as DRESDEN PLATE, KALEIDO-SCOPE, and DOUBLE WEDDING RING now is ROSE OF S H A R O N! Of course, I have placed our most recent out-going President SHARON Mills first on the Reserve List!

THE ART OF LANDSCAPE QUILTING by Nancy Zieman and Natalie Sewell - WOW! Over 50 beautiful quilts to study. Lots of tips, including how to shade with pens and pencils. Also check out the first two books they coauthored about how to create landscape quilts.

Our Library continues to grow with the help of so many of you who donate to the Silent Auction Table, and bid on items, through the purchase of 50/50 Tickets, and could not function without the assistance of so many volunteers. We can always use help – whether for five minutes, an hour, all day, before or after meetings. This is a nice way to meet members and be up close and personal with those great books!
