## President's Message

## Why Do You Quilt?

A few weeks ago, I was with a group of quilty friends, and the question, "Why do you quilt?" came up. Someone blurted out, "To get some quiet time from my husband!" Laughing aside, there are so many reasons why we are drawn to quilting. Here are some of the answers that were given:



#### 1. To learn a new skill:

Indeed, this was one of my reasons. Many years ago, as a new empty nester with an empty bedroom in my house, I found the opportunity to get back to dressmaking but ended up in a fabric store that was a quilt store. I was intrigued and decided to learn to quilt. It was a switch from dress patterns to block patterns, from 5/8" to 1/4" seam allowances, and from yardage to fat quarters, layer cakes, and jelly rolls. Instead of just sewing seams together, a quilt sandwich needs to be made, quilted, and bound. What about quilty math and all those rulers? When you think you've mastered something, there's always something new to learn: QAYG, paper piecing, appliqué, One-Block Wonder, curves ... the list goes on!

#### 2. To create gifts:

Whether for a new baby, a wedding, or to show appreciation, a quilt is a tangible expression of love and care. Nothing compares to the look on the face of a person who receives one. It makes all the time and effort you put into making the quilt so much worth it!

## 3. For the pride I get from a finished quilt:

Finishing a quilt brings a profound sense of pride and satisfaction. The journey from concept to completion involves countless steps and hours. Seeing a project and holding the finished piece in your hands is rewarding. We show our pride by displaying quilts at the Guild Show-and-Tell, in our homes, or submitting a quilt (or two!) for exhibit or competition.

## 4. It's a creative outlet:

When I started quilting, it was just to make a blanket. My first attempt was a king-sized quilt pattern—what a rookie mistake! I then took a Quilting Basics class, where we sewed and put blocks together. Everyone in the class made the same blocks, but we selected our own fabrics and arranged the blocks the way we each wanted. I was amazed that we all started from the same place but pro-

duced very different quilts. One of the reasons I love our Quilt Challenges so much is that the results reflect the personality and creativity of its maker.

Quilting allows us to experiment with colors, textures, and designs. I find it fulfilling to envision a design and bring it to life through fabric.

#### 5. It's a tradition:

Alright, who watched "The Fabric of Christmas" on Amazon? As with most Christmas specials, it was a bit cheesy, but I love the tradition it showed of gifting a wedding quilt to each generation. Collecting quilts is another way of preserving the tradition of quilts, passing down patterns, techniques, and the skill of quilting others.

A quilter in this group was a former math professor with quilts hanging in her office. She taught one of her students how to quilt. Word got out, and it became a popular afterschool gathering. Quilts are not a tradition in Filipino culture, so they aren't being handed down through the generations, but I certainly will help anyone who wants to learn to get started, which is my way of sharing the quilting tradition.

#### 6. It's therapeutic and meditative:

The rhythmic nature of quilting can be incredibly soothing. The repetitive motions of cutting, piecing, and sewing can create a meditative state and a sense of calm. Ok, that's before Jack (the Ripper) comes out! Before retirement, quilting was a way to relieve stress after a long day of dealing with the corporate grind. Similarly, a mother with young kids in our group said quilting was her quiet time after everyone had gone to bed.

#### 7. I love the sense of community:

One of my best friends refers to Quilt Retreats and Sew Days as "being around her people." This makes me laugh, but whether through quilting circles, online forums, workshops, or our Guild meetings, these gatherings are a source of support, inspiration, and friendship.

What a great discussion we had! When it came down to it, the very simple answer was that quilting gave us joy.

So, now it's my turn to ask, why do you quilt?

I wish you QUILTY JOY throughout the year!

## January 2025 Program and Workshop

## Program - David Owen Hastings "Quilt Labels to Love!" January 16, 2025, 10 a.m. on Zoom Only

I combine computer-printed custom labels with a woven logo label on my quilts to give them a professional finish, and to record important details for posterity (or for the recipient). Quilts are a wonderful art form, and you should sign your work with a distinctive label. It's a great opportunity for you to consistently brand



your quilts, especially those you gift to others at holidays or other special occasions.



It's also an opportunity to weave in the story of your quilt, so the story doesn't get lost. Was the quilt made for a special occasion? Was it made from a pattern, based on tradi-

tion, or is it a unique design? Who were the makers, and where was it made? Are there special fabrics used that require particular care? Imagine someone seeing your creation in the future – what would you want them to know?

I will walk participants through the steps to create these beautiful labels, and will share alternate labeling methods that draw from my graphic design background.

David will guide you through a creative process for designing your own modern abstract quilts, taking inspiration from architectural photos, to develop dynamic and unique quilt designs.

## MONUMENTAL INSPIRATION WITH UNLIMITED POSSIBILITIES!

Working from photos of architectural elements, David will guide you through the steps to design a minimodern fabric quilt inspired by architecture! You will learn the quilt-as-you-go method, sewing the top pieces, batting, and backing simultaneously. You'll



then add texture and complexity with David's unique approach to walking foot machine quilting where the quilting lines become a major design element. Learn to connect multiple quilted units with a "great gusset" joining technique, and then add a simple face binding for a modern finish.

## February 2025 Program

## Program - Suzanne Starjash -Trunk Show February 20, 2025, 10 a.m. In-Person/Zoom

My mother was my first artistic influence, and I am grateful for her encouragement. I enjoyed sewing in high school and took art classes in college. I loved seeing colorful fabric in sewing stores, but knew I would never make a garment with them. During the time I spent in the working world, weekend gardening and cooking were my main creative out-



lets, but I have carried an innate creativity with me throughout my life and always hoped to explore further opportunities to work with images and colors.

I didn't begin working with cloth artistically until I retired and moved from the San Francisco Bay Area to the Republic of Panama. My original hope was to paint with watercolor or oil on canvas. I located a fabric store before I found art supplies, however, and I had included my sewing machine in the items shipped to my new home. Since no one needs a quilt in the Central American tropics, I decided on decorative wall hangings for my new creative journey.

The native Cuna Indian women of Panama make wonderful handstitched molas with layers of fabric that depict local flora, fauna, and special events. Their bright tropical colors and fanciful subjects were an immediate inspiration for my first designs, and the jungle environment, quilting books, and input from friends soon followed. As I discovered more fabric stores with prints I liked, and learned more techniques, I invented new methods for each new project.

After returning to California and moving to northern Sonoma County, I connected with other quilters and started to learn the vocabulary and standard procedures of quilting. The classes I took were helpful and inspirational. My one concern was not to be overly influenced by teachers and lose my originality.

To stay spontaneous, I like to make each wall hanging quite different from those I have previously done. Trial, error, and perseverance are part of my creative process with every art quilt I make. I am ever watchful for new inspiration and enjoy learning new techniques. - Suzanne Starjash

## Technique Sharing Workshops (TSW)

Good things are happening for Technique Sharing Workshop and Super-sized TSW. What is a Super-sized TSW? A regular TSW is a free, 15-minute lesson given by one of our members, usually after a meeting. A Super-sized TSW is a larger event with more in-depth training. It takes place at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center (2050 Yulupa Ave) and because we have to rent the space, there is a small cost.

We're planning a Super-size TSW with Betty Upchurch on Friday, February 21, at the LBAGC, back by popular demand, teaching Free-Motion Quilting (FMQ) lessons. Betty can have 20 people with a short wait list. This workshop is 6-1/2 hours with a date yet to be determined. Betty makes beautiful quilt sandwiches to practice on, meaning there is a kit fee of \$20.00 and \$10.00 for the room rental. For accounting reasons, they have to be separate checks.

For our next regular TSW, we have Janice Juul who will be demonstrating the making of a sewing roll. This super-sweet sewing caddy is for sewing by hand. A pattern, fabric, and instructions will be provided at no cost. This workshop will take place on January 2, after the meeting adjourns, for a 15-minute tutorial. This project is a good one to open the year. Keep in mind there is limited seating and patterns, so sign up while there are still seats. I do have a special something to raffle to one the students after this TSW.

On June 5, Sue Stone will show us how to make a small ironing board for traveling. This is after the meeting, a 15-minute TSW. Vicki David (July 3) will be demonstrating her traditional binding method after the meeting for this 15-minute tutorial.

Here are a few ideas for possible workshops to finish 2025. For a regular TSW, do you have a gadget, doodad, or thingy that helps with some super-cool sewing trick or tip? What if we used denim for a slow sew or for big stitch quilting at the LBA&GC as a Super-sized TSW? Let's upcycle old jeans into a braided scrappy rug. Do you have a favorite pattern you could share with the group like a braided scrappy rug or bread basket or mug rugs, or the like? If you want to teach a TSW or a Super-size TSW, contact me.

Thank you all so much for your enthusiastic support and great ideas.

The size of the quilts will be 30" square, and the colors will be 80% of the quilt in challenge colors and 20% whatever you choose. The due date is July 3, 2025. I can't wait to see what we come up with!



Our Heart Pillow volunteers make and dis-




I would be so happy to have a few members join me in this *very low key*, *zero stress*, and *highly reward-ing* task.

## Receiving Blankets

Receiving Blankets for Flu Vaccine Incentive Hello Santa Rosa Quilt Guild.

The Santa Rosa Community Health Flu Vaccine Incentive was my bright idea. Home sewing could save the world, one vaccine at a time. The infants and children need vaccines to get into public schools. Their guardians are very good at getting their children vaccinated for whatever is required. The problem with Flu Vaccines is that two vaccines are required, the initial and four weeks later, the booster. The second visit typically doesn't happen but, if they do get their babies the booster, they receive a \$10.00 gift card. These days, \$10.00 is practically nothing. It will get you some bread and milk or a couple of gallons of gas...

So, at the time of the first flu shots we started giving them a toasty, cozy receiving blanket to swaddle their little ones. After that vaccine, they may find that the second vaccine is reasonable after all. The pilot program launched the project in the middle of December at their Vista Campus in north Santa Rosa.

Last year, SRCH delivered 134 babies. I have asked for 150 receiving blankets over the course of the year. As of this writing, 68 of the 150 have been turned in for the cause. I am so very proud of the outpouring of generosity and kindness, providing comfort, joy and health to the newest members of our world. I have every confidence that this incentive will lead to healthier communities in Sonoma County.

Simple blanket, two sides, make sure to use at least one layer of flannel, I like a square 36" by 36". Please pre-wash, these receiving blankets need to be baby ready.

#### **Delivery of Quilts**

We are still delivering quilts for 2024 as we write this, and will report the total number of quilts delivered in 2024 in the March newsletter.

In November and December we distributed guilts to the NICU in the three local hospitals. The nurses are very appreciative of the generosity and talent of the Santa Rosa Quilt Guild. We also gave lap size quilts to seniors in Santa Rosa through the Secret Santa program. We gave a variety of sizes of quilts to TLC Foster Services, and do-



nated raffle quilts to deserving organizations as well.

We gave 10 large guilts and 10 pillow cases to the Emancipated Youth (Teenagers who 'age out' of the Foster Care System). SRQG member Dorothy Murray makes up baskets for the Emancipated Youth filled with essentials that are needed when moving into a new apartment. Our

quilts and pillow cases are on top of the basket and are a beautiful message to our Youth of our care and love for them.



Barbecue

At the Santa Rosa VA Outpatient Clinic South, the CDCE (Center for Development & Civic Engagement) put on a Barbecue for Veterans to celebrate our Local Veterans for Veterans Day. The food was delicious and the weather was beautiful.

The highlight was the 105 quilts that were given out to veterans to show our gratitude for their service to our country. It was heartwarming to see the Veterans choose their quilt and hold it tight in their arms.

Thanks to Lavella Cassinelli for being the lead in making quilts for our Vet- Betty Upchurch erans, to Betty Upchurch for quilting



the tops, and to Mary Wood for binding each quilt and putting on the label. Others of us contributed some tops and quilting as well.

The quilts tops are mostly lap size (about 40" x 60"). We'd love to have some members help with the quilting of these tops. We will provide the top, batting, and backing. Please contact Laura Barrett to learn more.

## **Windsor Lions Donation**

We received a generous donation of \$350 from the Windsor Lions to be used for Community Quilts. In their words "We donate the proceeds of our fundraisers to worthy nonprofit organizations. In making our decision, we consider the value of the organization's contributions to the betterment of the community and society."

Betty Upchurch is our liaison with the Windsor Lions, and a perfect example making a contribution for the betterment of our community. We donate two guilts each year to the Windsor Lions to be used in their fundraisers. Betty delivers these quilts and often is the one who does the guilting.

## **Upcoming Events**

Our next big event is the **Quiltathon** on Thursday, February 6, at the Veteran's Building. We have three Quiltathons a year, and they are an active, lively event during which we work on quilts that we will distribute to the community. We start with layered guilt sandwiches, smoothing and pinning them. These are stitched around the edges leaving an opening for turning (known as the pillow case or envelope method.) The quilts are then trimmed and turned right side out. The next stage is edge stitching with our expert sewers sewing 1/8" from the edge, catching the opening and making a nice edge to the guilt. The quilts are then quilted by machine. Then our hand sewers put on one of our labels. Lastly, the guilts are reviewed by our 'quality control' team making sure no pins or needles are left in a quilt, trimming threads, and removing excess lint and threads with lint rollers. As you can see, there is a job for everyone. One of the favorite aspects of the Quiltathon is the opportunity to visit with our long-time friends, and to make new friends. As a thank you for our efforts, our Hospitality Committee will serve a soup lunch. We will be available to answer all your questions about the Quiltathon at our first in-person meeting of 2025 on January 2 at the Veterans Building.

50" x 65"	For 18-year-olds aging out of the Foster Care system, and for women residing at the YWCA Safe House.	
40" x 60"	Lap quilts for adults to be handed out by Secret Santa, women being served by Verity, seniors in local convales- cent hospitals, and others.	
14" - 18" Square Doll Quilts	For little girls and boys. We collect them throughout the year and donate during the holidays.	

## Welcome Committee


Hello Santa Rosa Quilt Guild.
