## sew a row program

As you read this, most of the Sew-a-Row projects have been completed, and the remainder will be completed shortly. Don't miss the show on December 7, when we display the completed tops. At that time, we will have a lottery to determine who takes each top home.

It's not too early to start thinking about making a starter row for next year's program. Jan Andrews will be the 2007 chair for the program. Please submit your starter rows to her before Christmas. The rows should be 24-1/2" in length, with height proportional. They may be pieced and/or appliquéd, but should not be just a hunk of fabric (no matter how decorative the print.) Submit your row with at least 1/4 yard of fabric(s) used in your row. In January, these packets will be on display for members to sign up to add a row during one of four periods of 2007. Each period is approximately two months - plenty of time to construct your row. You may sign up for more than one project, and it is not necessary to submit a starter row to be eligible to add a row.

There will be information sheets available during November meetings describing the program in more detail, and providing measurements for the rows.

# library news



One of the most asked for types of books lately has been “table runners.” Carolyn DuPar told me she enjoys making them because they make such nice gifts. Others have mentioned that they add that little extra to their homes for holidays, and brighten the home on just regular days. Table runners take much less fabric than quilts, and depending on the intricacy of the pattern, usually are finished in less time. The last time a guild member requested a book about table runners they were all checked out, but I suggested she might like to look at some of the books in our Folk Art, or Scraps, or Fat Quarters, or Blocks sections. Table runners can be started from an orphan block you may have leftover from a project, or from a block that you experimented with but did not like the size, color, or proportion of, and then start adding borders to fit the size of your particular table. I got to thinking about this and decided to compile lots of ideas for table runners, mainly snippets from current catalogs in my sewing room, and have “authored” and “self published” a one-of-a-kind reference book just for our quilt guild. It is entitled TABLE RUNNER IDEAS (and it is signed by the author!). I invite everyone to add ideas, suggestions, and maybe even photographs of some of the table runners you make. Who knows – this little notebook may be the start of other idea books for our library.

Sometimes I spend a lot of money for a book and upon reading it wonder why. This time I am wondering why more was not charged for this book: COLLABORATIVE QUILTING by Freddy Moran and Gwen Marston. This is a thick book (255 pages) and is FULL of beautiful colored pictures of the brightest, happiest, craziest quilts one can imagine. Mix Freddy’s black and white and reds plus lots of other vibrant colors with Gwen’s uninhibited designs and the results are unique pieces of art that I have a hard time taking my eyes from. Learn the secret of their “parts department” and an innovative way of making units ahead of time then trying to figure out how to fit them into

the puzzle. I so enjoyed the chapters about how the two ladies got together and decided to design and make quilts together; the pictures and descriptions of their two homes and work areas three-quarters of a continent apart; the patterns that are very liberating; EVERY page was exciting. It makes me wish for that one perfect person to pair up to quilt with. But wait! Time and time again I have teamed up with various individuals and groups in our very own quilt guild to sew with and have not only come up with some quilts I could not have done on my own, but made some terrific friends in the process. I can obtain the book for about \$13.50 if you “need” one.

Our Hospitality Chairman, Linda Hooper, requested PERFECT HAND QUILTING WITHOUT PAIN by Liuxin Newman. Linda and I guessed at the pronunciation of the author’s first name. My curiosity got the best of me and I e-mailed the author in Australia. Her husband very quickly wrote back to me: “The X sound in Mandarin is very nearly the same as “sh” in English, so best for us English speakers is to imagine it as Loo-shin with an even accent on each syllable.” That solved, Linda and I studied the book and decided that if Liuxin is ever in our vicinity we must take her quilting class. She has made a complete study of quilting without pain and explains it in a very clear, gentle, and wise manner.

ORGANIZING YOUR CRAFT SPACE by Jo Packham is a little book filled with great artistic pictures and ideas to help you put together your tools, whether they be for quilting (see Freddy Moran’s studio), scrapbooking, beading, stamping, stained glass, stenciling, yarns crafts – all arts which go hand in hand.

Have you been waiting for a Jennifer Chiaverini or Earlene Fowler novel for ages? That wait has been halved as we have received a gift of many of these novels, so now we have second copies!

# the lost art of “making do”

My grandmother made quilts from scraps as did most women of her era, especially during the depression. It was a way to make a warm coverlet for your family without having to spend money to buy a blanket. It was a pleasant pastime and especially challenging when fabric choices were limited.

On October 18, 1935, my grandmother wrote in her diary “....finished my 13th w.r. (wedding ring) block under difficulties lacking the plain blue for corners - tho’ pieced some from scraps which was quite a science...”

Obviously she was “making do” as many of us have done. I do it when I run out to the kitchen many evenings and decide what to have for dinner! But what I’m trying to say is, that for *those* ladies during the depression, “making do” was a necessity of life.



I have just a few of her quilts. They were all made of scraps, and although the wedding ring quilt I have (she made the top for my mother) has new fabric for the solid pink and bright blue at each of the corners, all the rings are made from printed scraps and among those, there are many 1 1/2"x 2 pieces that have been pieced together from smaller pieces. Sometimes not the same fabric, but always a similar color. Imagine! And this was not the only wedding ring quilt she made; there were three more for her other daughters-in-law!

Her “Birds in Flight” small quilt that I have is nothing but one and one and one half inch half-square triangles, pieced together by hand. It is made of tiny scraps of cotton, but also includes silk and lightweight wool and rayon. As it has aged, of course, the silk and wool have been the first to deteriorate, but she probably was only concerned about color (actually dark and light) and not thinking about its long term life when she was putting it together!

As I wandered through the PQIF quilt show this year it occurred to me that this was definitely not a show of “making do”. There were very few “scrap quilts”. This was an exhibition of quiltmakers making small (wall) quilts (few were bed size) of expensive fabrics, embellishments, battings and luminous quilting threads made and quilted on expensive sewing machines. They were certainly outstanding works of art, but I kept thinking that the origin of *making a quilt* was to take what you had available and to develop from it not only a warm coverlet, but also the most beautiful, enjoyable creation your talents and imagination could provide.

A few days later I went to see the “Quilts from Gee’s Bend”. What a tribute to the art of “Making Do”! There they were in all their glory for thousands (maybe millions) to see. What is their appeal? I can’t help but think that all of us can relate to these women who took the few pieces of fabric they had and turned them into dynamic statements of individual expression. They used no templates, no patterns and did not run out to the quilt store to buy just the fabric they wanted. They used their leftover dress fabrics, old clothes, sheets and mill ends. The batting was the leftover cotton wool from the local fields, stretched by hand on the feedsack backings. Their design tables were their laps and their tools were their fingers, scissors, needles and thread. The results are stunning! Creations of the heart and mind and soul. These women from Gee’s Bend have proven that utility can become great art when given the opportunity of expression.

*Hooray for “Making Do”!*

# january program

In January, Dale Fleming will be joining us for her program, Inspiration into Art. Dale's trunk and slide show reflects on the many paths an idea may take before it becomes a quilt. Her quilts have been accepted into PIQF and Quilt National. Dale has appeared on Simply Quilts and is the author of *Pieced Curves So Simple*. Dale has developed methods that allow quilters to expand their skills as they explore new possibilities. In her workshop on January 20, The Six-Minute Circle and So Much More, we will learn how to machine-piece a circle into a background using the pinless piecing method featured in her book. (Yes, machine-piece, not machine appliqué!) This method is so versatile that even a first timer can easily make a perfect machine-pieced circle. She will also show how to make tips, convex curves, and play with patterns and the method to make simple leaf blocks. So, if you have always dreamed of incorporating circles into your quilts, reserve time to let Dale transform how you quilt, by learning this fast, easy, pinless piecing technique.

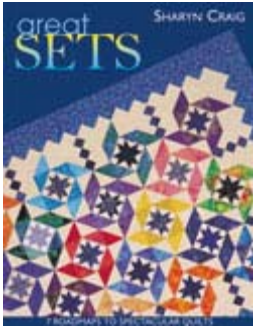

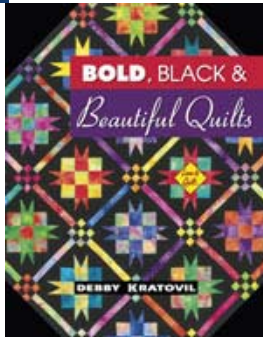


# 2007 programs preview
