technique sharing workshops

Many thanks to our recent teachers: Marilyn Swanson, Mitzi Dowling, Juanita Campbell, and Suzanne Havens, who all shared their expertise and enthusiasm with us.

Our next Technique Sharing Workshop (or TSW for short), will take place at the Luther Burbank Art & Garden Center during the 5th Thursday Retreat on Oct. 30th, at 10am, when Diana Roberts will teach us "WALKING FOOT MACHINE QUILTING FOR BABY QUILTS." The retreat is open from 8:30 - 3:30 (it is free and you can come any time and work on community quilts, the boutique, wheelchair bags, or your own projects). The TSW class will start at 10am. Bring your machine, thread and a walking foot that fits on your machine. You need to see your sewing machine dealer ahead of time to purchase a walking foot if you do not have one. Community Quilts always needs more help quilting the many quilts our guild likes to donate, so this is a wonderful way to learn a new technique and then use it often to help the guild and all the charities we like to support. The price of the TSW is to machine guilt at least one baby guilt, and hopefully many more!

In November we will be back at the Scottish Rite Temple for two TSWs following our regular meetings. On Nov. 6th, Pam Brown will teach "BEAUTIFUL ENVELOPES & GIFT BAGS FROM RECYCLED CALENDARS." That says it all doesn't it? But really...do you have beautiful guilt calendars you could not bear to throw away?? Turn them into wonderful envelopes and mini gift bags to delight your quilting friends. Pam will bring a variety of templates and a stack of calendars for you to try. Quick, easy and addictive! Bonus: Those tiny photos on the back of the calendar?? Turn them into small gift cards or magnets! Any of the guilt or scenic 12" calendars work well - single large images do not work as well. Bring paper scissors, ballpoint pen, ruler and template plastic if you want to make


pointless sisters

library news

Our guild library continues to grow (now over 2,000 books, plus tons of periodicals) with the support of our Silent Auction Table and the 50/50 Drawing. The library cannot function without the assistance of many, many people. If you have an extra five minutes to volunteer, we train on the spot. If you are new to the guild, ask to learn more about how our library can help you. There is never enough time during my book introductions to fill you in on all of the details.

Our July speaker, Rita Hutchens, generously donated her CD TOTALLY TUBULAR (Half-square Triangles and Sawtooth Borders) for our library. This CD can be viewed on a computer fit with a program of Windows 98 or more current. The CD is packed with information for everyone from a beginner to the most advanced guilter.

Our copy of the TOTALLY TUBULAR QUILTS book grew legs and walked away from our quilt guild before Rita even spoke to our guild. I was hoping that the book would be returned, but since it was not, and because there were so many on the reserve list, I ordered another copy for our library. If the person who borrowed the book suddenly realizes that it has a pretty "Property of Santa Rosa Quilt Guild" label on the binding of the book, an envelope inside the front cover to hold the checkout card, and sees that it is stamped "Property of Santa Rosa Quilt Guild" inside the front cover, then maybe the book can be returned to the library table – no questions asked. It is such a popular book that the extra copy will be useful to have.

CREATE YOUR OWN HAND-PRINTED CLOTH – Stamp, Screen & Stencil with Everyday Objects by Rayna Gillman – Create one-of-a-kind cloth with objects you find at home or in the hardware store. Use these techniques on cotton, silk, or rayon. There are no mistakes – if the fabric you create is just too ugly to live, cut it up into little pieces to piece back together, incorporate it into the backing for a quilt, use it for gift wrap, give it away – nothing lost. Every page is filled with lots of colored photo examples, many tips, and great instructions. This book is just the beginning of what we can do!

Joanie Bellinghausen asked if I would obtain Mary Lou Weidman's FLOWER POWER book. While looking for the book I came across Mary Lou's HOOCHY MAMA QUILTS book and decided that we should be treated to both. Just the title HOOCHY MAMA makes me laugh. Say it a few times – it is fun! And fun is what Mary Lou is all about. I had the privilege of hosting Mary Lou when she spoke at our guild many years ago. Everywhere she looked she saw inspiration for one of her



story guilts, and I caught her fever. I discovered that maybe her extra energy came from Starbuck's as she lives in Washington state. At the time she stayed with me here in Sonoma we had no Starbuck's, and she suffered greatly. books encourage "wonky" points, but for the perfectionist in us, she also shows us how to be precise with her patterns. Mary Lou's guilts are always colorful. We have her first three books in our library. You will recognize the UNCLE SAM WANTS YOU TO QUILT quilt that Carolle LeMonnier made to advertise this year's Guild Challenge from one of Mary Lou's earlier books. I could not resist treating our three members of this year's Challenge to Mary Lou's pin featuring that cute quilt. I believe we had the most participation in this challenge in our history. What a super job Carolle, Joanie Bellinghausen, and Kathy Hannan did! And thanks to Joanie for being an extra set of eyes for our library acquisitions! I am always thankful for all the help I can get.

Just in time for Halloween a darling little book has been donated, and I am definitely putting Jan Andrews name first on the Reserve List as she our guild's Queen of Halloween (but that does NOT make her a Witch!). FRIGHTFULLY CRAZY by The Buggy Barn caught my eye with the wonky pieced candy corn border on the cover. Inside the front cover is a cute quilt of cats that would even make my three felines laugh. I also am bewitched by the quilt inside the back cover – witches riding brooms under a cheddar moon.

MAKING HISTORY – QUILTS & FABRIC FROM 1890-1970 – 9 Reproduction Quilt Projects, Historic Notes & Photographs, Dating Your Quilts by Barbara Brackman - her second book about fabric and its influence on the look of American quilts. As always, Barbara is very thorough with her research and includes lots of historic pictures.

friendship blocks

The weather is getting cooler and I know a lot of us will be spending more time in our sewing rooms. How about working on a friendship block. When you sign up to do a block, you are only committing yourself to do that one block, nothing else, which makes friendship blocks a fun way to try a new method, or use up some of your scraps.

Right now we have a birdhouse block for Marian Fryer. The instructions are simple; just make a block any size square or rectangle from 6 ½ to 12 ½ inches featuring a birdhouse. For more details see our friendship block page on our website.

Library News continued

12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS by Nancy Halvorsen – Choose to make all twelve blocks and put them into a quilt, or maybe make one for a wall quilt, another for a pillow – whatever time allows. Also included are patterns for aprons, tea towels, fingertip hot mitts, pear pincushions, a table runner, and a unique fabric "countdown 'til Christmas" project. This is a skinny little book that is fat with ideas.

Sharon Mills requested GARDEN TWIST QUILTS by Sharon Yenter. This is another small book that is packed with great information. This "twist" pattern is actually the very first quilt that I made in a class taught by Trudie Hughes in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, way back in the late 1970's. It is a great pattern that looks complicated to make, but is actually very, very easy. Besides instructions for every size from crib/lap to queen/king, there is also a pattern for a pillow and a garden wreath wall quilt to complete the ensembles.

When Pam Brown mentioned that she is working on a black and white butterfly project I wondered if A BLACK & WHITE GARDEN by Kay M. Capps Cross would be helpful to her. There are simple patterns for a tulip, sunflower, coneflower, bird of paradise, and more flowers.

After Juanita Campbell's TSW (Technique Sharing Workshop) on September 3, there was a new interest in our collection of Hawaiian books. I have added three new titles, all by the same author, Poakalani Serrao: POAKALANI HAWAIIAN QUILT CUSHION PATTERNS & DESIGNS – FIFTEEN ORIGINAL BLOCK PATTERNS AND DESIGNS FOR BOTH THE EXPERIENCED AND BEGINNING QUILTER - - Volumes Three AND Four, and THE HAWAIIAN QUILT – THE TRADITION CONTINUES.

There is no limit to the number of items you may check out at a time, but it is really appreciated it you return them all at the very next meeting as there is quite often another person waiting to check out the book or magazine.


