CATHY MILLER CDS: Jackie Harris was moved by guest Cathy Miller who serenaded us on February 6 with two quilting songs she wrote and Jackie made a donation earmarked to purchase one of her CDs. These are good entertainment when hand stitching on those bindings, or in the car on the way to the next fabric shop. Some of Cathy's songs will have you laughing, others close to tears. One that I still giggle about is THE FROG STITCH (rip-it, rip-it, rip-it).

THE QUILTS OF GEE'S BEND VIDEO: New member Diane Hock donated the companion video to our book. It is interesting to put the names, faces, and voices with the quiltmakers.

FABRIC by Suzanne Trocme: Another relatively new member, Sharon Mills, suggested this reference book for our Library. It is not specifically about quilting or cotton fabrics, but with the many art quilters in our group it will help de-mystify the other fabrics we find in shops that might just fit into our projects.

COLOR-BRIGHT QUILTS FOR KIDS by Leisure Arts is a compilation of cute children's quilts from the Fons and Porter magazines. I put Lavella Cassinelli first on the Reserve List. (If newer members do not know about Reserve Lists, come back to the Library corner for an introduction to the many ways we try to make checking out books easy for you.)

ELM CREEK QUILTS – QUILT PROJECTS INSPIRED BY THE ELM CREEK QUILTS NOVELS by Jennifer Chiaverini: If you have read the Elm Creek novels (all of them owned by our Library) you will want to check out this book by Jennifer and Nancy Odom. Not only are the projects lovely, but the references to the characters of the book are good reminders of the stories we have enjoyed.

DEBBIE MUMM'S 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS by Debbie Mumm: It is never too early for Christmas, so when we received an anonymous donation of this book, the Reserve List immediately filled up.

RED AND WHITE AMERICAN REDWORK QUILTS AND PATTERNS by Deborah Harding: Phyllis Gallaway has been tracking down some Redwork books for us, so when I found this two book set, I did not hesitate to add it to our collection. It is a very good reference book for our Library as it not only includes a ton of patterns and ideas on how to use them, but a complete history of Redwork.

UNCOVERINGS, American Quilt Study Group. This is book number 23 (and we have the entire collection tucked away in our closet – and if you are not familiar with the closet – let us introduce you to the REST of our over 1400 books!). This small book is full of in-depth research papers about every aspect of quilting imaginable (and never imagined).

OFF CENTER PATCHWORK by Cheryl A. Adam: The very first workshop I ever took at our Guild, 13 years ago, was taught by Margaret Miller). When I walked into that workshop I was shaking as I thought I was way in over my head but I was quickly made to feel welcome by all. Margaret completely exhausted me and taught me to take a common ninepatch block and make it totally different. Cheryl takes that idea in her book and encourages us to "get out of our boxes." Her projects are easy to do with her good instructions.

15 TWO-BLOCK QUILTS – UNLOCK THE SECRETS OF SECONDARY PATTERNS by Claudia Olson: Former President, Justine Lott, requested this book. This author tells us the criteria for choosing two quilt blocks to sit side-by-side and thus making a new, more dynamic look.

FABRIC DYEING FOR BEGINNERS by Vimala McClure. Virginia Lindstrom asked me to purchase this for her, and when it arrived of course I had to peak at it. Fabric dyeing still is not EASY, but the author gives very specific instructions on how to do it. Even if you do not choose to dye fabrics yourself you will understand the process and know what you are looking at when you see the beautifully hand-dyed fabrics that are now available to us in the shops.
