Well, our visit with Phil Beaver will be a tough act to follow, but your hardworking Programs Team still has a few wonderful presentations and workshops ahead.



In Friday's workshop she will teach the technique—" no patterns, this is art"!

santa rosa quilt guild library

Yes, this is a lengthy list of brand new books in our Library, but please remember that this newsletter covers two months rather than just one. As we continue to raise funds at our Silent Auction Table and the 50/50 drawing I will continue to seek out the variety of books that you are requesting. I am rewarded over and over again with the terrific quilts our guild members share at our SEW and Tell.

I know - the book PET GIFTS does not sound like it should be in a quilting library, but check out page 20 and find a puppy wearing a patchwork coat and that right there qualifies it for me! Meri-Kay Gurnee, our Corresponding Secretary, requested this book for our Library, and I am SEW glad that she did. There are all sorts of cute ideas to make our critters gifts and toys from our scraps - and great ideas to sell at our Boutique!

In QUILT & EMBELLISH IN ONE STEP Linda Potter has developed "Needle Magic" - a fast and easy technique to make quilts sparkle with hand quilting, applique and beading. I especially like how the author lists her favorite supplies by name, and states the reasons she prefers them - very helpful when shopping since she has done our homework for us.

Sharon Mills and Virginia Lindstrom both asked for MACHINE QUILTING IN SECTIONS - DON'T FINISH ANOTHER QUILT UNTIL YOU READ THIS BOOK by Marti Michell. Marti has taken Georgia Bonesteel's "lap quilting" method to the next step. So, if you want to make a big ol' quilt, but can't figure out how to stuff it all under your sewing machine to quilt it, you might want to try working in sections as this book suggests.

Polly Breckinridge spied Dale Fleming's PIECED CURVES SO SIMPLE. Here you learn a pinless technique that really works for machine sewing curves and circles. The quilt colors are represented in bright, snappy colors!

Marilyn Altenbach asked for the collection of five 20 x 28" full color pattern sheets for making alphabet letter blocks in INITIALLY YOURS by Pam Bono. As these sheets are loose, not in a book form, I will ask for everyone's watchful eye in keeping these patterns together in their envelope.

And another book with loose pattern sheets (forty-eight in all) is FOLLOW-THE-LINE QUILTING DESIGNS - FULL-SIZE PATTERNS FOR BLOCKS AND BORDERS by Mary Covey. This was very, very highly recommended by our long-arm quilting member, Vandy Noble. But by no means is this limited to machine quilters. There is a border pattern for a bear wandering through pine trees, as well as a kitty scampering through "meows," and apples, and airplanes in clouds, hearts, leaves, tulips, and many, many more ideas to help make your quilt a quilt.

Phyllis Gallaway recommended five more books that recent speaker Billie Lauder has written. These little books are full of helpful information. They are all autographed, too! They are: QUILTING IN THE BIG STITCH STYLE; LET'S MAKE SQUARES & RECTANGLES; LET'S MAKE TRIANGLES; GET LOOPED WITH BILLIE LAUDER - A NEW LOOK AT BARGELLO QUILTS, 2ND EDITION; and DIAMONDS CAN BE A QUILTER'S BEST FRIEND.

THE QUILTMAKER'S GIFT, a lovely fable written by Jeff Brumbeau and beautifully illustrated by Gail de Marcken's watercolors, is an award-winning book that delighted not only our guild members, but their families and friends, young and golden, when it was introduced five years ago. They have joined together to bring us the prequel THE QUILTMAKER'S JOURNEY. I have a feeling that this book was written about a wonderful person like our very own Lavella Cassinelli and all of our guild members who help create community quilts. (Don't forget to peek on the reverse side of the protective cover and search for the 22 hidden quilt patterns.)

Earlene Fowler somehow keeps finding new family members for Benni Harper and police chief Gabe Ortiz to help entertain us with more stories centered in the fictional town of San Celine (San Luis Obispo?). DELECTABLE MOUNTAINS, her twelfth murder mystery is maybe my favorite of all. Jump right in reading the novel, bypassing the hints on the flyleaf, so you will be totally surprised as the story develops. I very highly suggest that you start reading Fowler's novels with the first, and in order, so that you can easily follow the progression of the characters. I have numbered the books inside the front cover.

YOU DID WHAT?? WITH MY T-SHIRTS! by Judy Bobbitt and Katie Reed turns those cherished commemorative T-shirts into quilts - the secret is in the stabilizer!

Pam McVey found for us BLENDING PHOTOS WITH FABRIC - A BEAUTIFUL NEW WAY TO COMBINE PHOTOGRAPHY, PRINTING AND QUILTING by Mary Ellen Kranz and Cheryl Hayes. Use photographs from your regular or digital camera, or any other item, to add to your quilts. Lots of good technical advice to help us with our computers.

Summer is a wonderful time to read - check out lots of books!!!



an interview with janet shore

Isn't it strange that Janet's visits to her son and daughter-in-law coincide in July at the exact time of year as the Sister's Quilt Show in Bend, Oregon? What a deal! Janet was born in San Francisco and learned those "city slicker ways" at an early age. She is one smart, talented, fun lady!

Janet's expertise and creative talents with yarns and fabrics were further enhanced while employed at Capwell's as a buyer and instructor of tailoring and dress making. Once a former student of hers invited her to take a quilting class with Roberta Horton. She responded "why would I want to do that"? She did attend and has been quilting ever since.

In 1978 Janet joined the East Bay Heritage Quilters. While a member she held most offices in the organization, was a representative to NCQC and also began a drop in group where members could come and sew. In 1984 she co-chaired two quilting symposiums which were attended by several popular quilting teachers as presenters. I understand money wasn't an issue in the EBHQ guild, therefore they had unlimited choices to hire skilled professional teachers and authors.

Many of Janet's quilt's have been featured in quilting magazines.

She felt most honored at Jean Ray Laury's request to feature a picture of her quilted vest in one of Jean's published books. Also, Janet has had her own exhibits a New Pieces, Berkeley; Quilt National in Ohio; Art galleries in Washington state; UC College in Santa Barbara; while one exhibit of her work was in Japan, via mail. Her expertise includes judging juried shows, again, "all over the map".

Janet suggests it's everyone's advantage to take as many quilting classes as possible. I asked, "How would you like to be remembered"? Her answer, "As being cheerful, sharing and willing to help others acquire the love of quilting as I have in my life". Janet in all of her modesty states, "I just make quilts".



2006-7 opportunity (raffle) quilt

Remember the old saying "you can't please all the people all the time"? Well, maybe you can! Our Guild Board has come up with what we think is a super idea. For our next Opportunity (and now we can legally say "raffle") quilt we are going to offer TWO! One will be a smaller, maybe wall hanging size that will be CONTEM-PORARY; the second will be a bed-size in a TRADITIONAL style!

Sharon Mills and I have offered to co-chair the making of the TRADITIONAL quilt this year. Mary Wood and Carolynn Marriott immediately stepped up to offer to assist, and we look forward to many, many more guild members helping out with the process. The four of us met and scoured hundreds of photos, leafed through dozens of books, discussed scores of ideas, and we have come up with a very simple, wonderful block that everyone can help us make - an OFFSET LOG CABIN.

For every block that you turn in you may have one credit for the Friendship Blocks (see Lynn Williams for more details on that program).

Sharon Mills will supply us with the directions for constructing the block and will send that out by e-mail. For those who do not have a computer, you may pick up a hard copy of the directions in the Library area.

This block is absolutely fool-proof and a very good way for you to check to see if your cutting is accurate, as well as your sewing of quarter inch seams. If when adding each and every log they do not fit perfectly, then you will know that your ruler and/or seam allowance is off and you will be able to compensate immediately.

I once again cannot emphasize enough that the fabrics you use MUST be 100% cotton (if you are in doubt, please do not include them in the block), AND pre-washed (it would be a shame for one little piece of fabric to run and ruin the entire quilt). And of course, no selvages.

As this is a "traditional" quilt, please choose more "traditional" fabrics. Keep in mind that you will have DARKS on one side and LIGHTS on the other. You will want to scrutinize each fabric to make sure that it is not too "medium" in value in comparison to the others. You will focus on CONTRAST between the light and the dark side.

Please do not use any 'solid' fabrics. Tone-on-tones are fine, as are batiks, and of course, prints, dots, calicoes, and homespuns are absolutely wonderful

On the "light" side, off-whites, creams, light beige colors will be great (but no bright, stark whites). Tone-ontones are good, "shirting" prints, tiny or little dots are fine, etc. We will have sample blocks on display in the Library area if you are in doubt.

While you have your fabrics out, would you also cut at least three different 2-1/2 x 6" pieces of your Darks for the pieced border.

The deadline for the blocks: Our Founders' Day meeting, the third Thursday in September - September 15, 2005. There will be a basket next to the bulletin board of samples in the Library area for collection.

Please attach your name to the back of the block to be given credit for the Friendship Block program, and to enter your name in a drawing. Leftover blocks will be used for incentives for members who sell the most tickets.


Our very own talented Vandy Noble has very generously offered to long-arm machine quilt this project for us. Whew - that is a load off our minds!!!

We hope that you will all participate in not only making the blocks and donating fabric for the borders, but will offer to help us with the many tasks associated with making a quilt, such as arranging the blocks on a design wall, sewing, making the borders, binding, creating a label, AND buying (and/or selling) at least \$20 worth of tickets as without the proceeds from the Opportunity/Raffle Quilts we would not have such fine speakers as Cynthia England and Phil Beaver.

This is a great way to meet more guild members. Hope you can all help to make this quilt really special.

2006/2007 OPPORTUNITY QUILT BLOCK OFFSET LOG CABIN

Due September 15, 2005



Unfinished block size 8"

LIGHTS:

#1 - 2" X 2"

#4 - 2" X 3 1/2"

#6 - 2" X 5"

#8 - 2" X 6 1/2"

Lights should be off-whites, creams, light beige, tone-on-tone "shirting" prints, tiny or little dots, etc.

NO BRIGHT/STARK WHITES Darks should not be too "medium" in value in contrast with others. Choose ANY color or texture, please mix them.

Want a SCRAPPY look.

NO SOLIDS PLEASE!

DARKS:

#2 - 2" X 2"

#3 - 2" X 3 1/2"

#5 - 2" X 5"

#7 - 2" X 6 1/2"

#9 - 2" X 8"

Starting with pieces #1 (light) and #2 (dark), with the dark on top sew the light square to the bottom. The next log #3 will be a dark, sew it on the RIGHT HAND SIDE of the first two squares. Then add the #4 light log on the bottom TOUCHING THE LIGHT SQUARE. Now add the #5 dark log, ETC.

USE ONLY 100% COTTON and PRE-WASHED fabrics. Please do not use any 'solid' fabrics. Tone-on-tones are fine, as are batiks, prints, dots, calicoes, and homespuns.

Dear Melody,

I've never made an art quilt, but have made several quilts. Will this be a daunting task for a beginner at art quilts?

Dear Beginner,

Art quilts are much easier to make than traditional quilts. Traditional quilts usually require that things in the design match up, or fit nicely together to promote the design concept. Art quiltmaking suggests that you forget the rules and make up your own. This is not to say that all art quilts are imbued with a 'devil may care' attitude, but some do, and yet they have a certain bravado often referred to, in my work, as Slap Dash.

Art quiltmaking tends toward the original, or innovative or in my case, lazy. I am always looking for the easy way out and if the design goes off kilter, so much the better. Art quilts generally are meant to hang on the wall, hence they need not be made in an enduring manner. No one should expect to wash an art quilt, or sit on it or really handle it too much. Or look too closely.

Construction can be done by sewing, or fusing or glueing, and as long as anything that falls off can be reglued, it passes muster.

I realize that one who comes from a tradition of doing a good job may find this unstructured approach a bit daunting, and in the beginning you may still want to employ some finesse. No one will take you to task for being too exacting, but you may not get much credit for the care you took, and that may make you feel underappreciated. This experience might allow your next creation to take a few shortcuts and of course, the result will look incorrect to you. However, resist the urge to point out the mistakes. These may be the very thing that makes your piece artistic.

You will soon find that you are making many more quilts, much faster and with more enjoyment and will begin to notice that your old tradition bound chums are getting a little envious of your output and are making disparaging remarks under their breath. This cannot be avoided.

You have moved on and it is probably time to seek out others like yourself who are more interested in doing something personal, original and idiosyncratic than 'doing it just like it **should** be done'. There are plenty of us out here, and the number is growing everyday. We are interested in freeing you from the tedium of correctness, and will support your inventions and experiments and applaud your mismatched seams, if you have seams.

Of course it is OK to fuse, it is not cheating. It is a means to an end. A happy end.
