FEBRUARY PROGRAM AND WORKSHOP

Marilyn Maddalena of Sacramento will be entertaining us in February with her program From Russia - with Quilts! Her program compares Russian quilting, past and present, with American quilting. Marilyn toured Russia, staying with quilters and their families. She brings Russian fabrics, quilts and other items - and great stories - from Russia to share with the guild.

The workshop for February is Seminole piecing, taught by our very own Linda Morand. Linda is a long-time SRQG member who has been quilting for more than 20 years. Her quilts have won awards and have appeared in several publications. Linda whet our appetite for Seminole piecing during her Technique Sharing Workshop demonstration last year. In this class, we will learn to do a sampler of several patterns, which may be made into a pillow or part of another project.

March Program and Workshop

We are fortunate to have internationally-recognized Kitty Pippin for our guest artist in March. Kitty will be presenting a trunk show of exquisite pieced and appliqued quilts, featuring Asian fabrics and sashiko embroidering. Her work draws from her years growing up in China and her fascination with Japanese fabrics. Although Kitty did not start quilting until she retired, she has been winning awards every since!

Kitty's workshop is titled "Octagonal Block Quilt". Like most of her work, the sample is made from Japanese fabrics. However, it is a pattern that would work well in batiks or any other focus fabric. This wall hanging is primarily machine pieced and does not require any set-in seams. For those who are interested, Kitty will also demonstrate the art of sashiko embroidery. Take advantage of her visit and sign up early!

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild Library

Our library has never had a longer Reserve List than the one on Caryl Bryer Fallert's CD Rom **DRAWING WITH THREAD: THE FINE ART OF MACHINE QUILTING.** Linda Sims, Technique Sharing Chairperson, suggested that I obtain a second copy so that more people could benefit from the terrific information. If you have a computer, be sure to put your name on the list to check out this very well written information by the woman who was the very first quilter to win the Best of Show award in Paducah, Kentucky, with a machine quilted masterpiece.

TIME TO QUILT - FUN QUILTS AND RETREAT IDEAS FOR 1 OR 101 by Anne Moscicki is the perfect book for Melissa Trunick in case she ever runs out of ideas. There are ideas from setting aside time to quilt at home to organizing weekend getaways with fellow quilters, plus lots of quilt patterns for individuals or groups.

I saw Linda Franz, the author of **QUILTED DIAMONDS** on Alex Anderson's Simply Quilts TV show. This is in the style of historical quilter Jane Stickle's DEAR JANE quilt, but as the name indicates, each of the 209 blocks are in the shape of a diamond. And if you are a Jane Austen lover, you will be especially delighted in the quotations from her novels. This would make a great take-along project as the instructions are superb for hand piecers.

Phyllis Gallaway suggested Eleanor Burns' **DELECTABLE MOUNTAINS QUILT** from the Quilt in a Day series. Eleanor continues to write clearly, including not only tons of valuable information, photos of quilts and techniques, but also a ruler in the back pocket of the book to trim the blocks easily.

Phyllis also located Eleanor Burns' **FLYING GEESE** from the Quilt in a Day series. Eleanor has a bit of a different take on the traditional Flying Geese assembly - she uses two squares to form two units, easy enough for an eleven-year-old to do, as illustrated by the quilt on the cover.

If you have an embroidery machine you will definitely want to check out the ideas in **BALTIMORE IN BLOOM** by Pam Bono. There are also other home decorating projects, such as curtains, tablecloths, placemats, etc.

Virginia Lindstrom requested **QUILT-LOVERS' FAVORITES FROM AMERICAN PATCHWORK AND QUILTING MAGAZINE**, Volume 3, by Better Homes and Gardens. There is a style and technique for everyone in this beautiful book, from traditional to contemporary. Each pattern comes in multiple sizes and I especially like the color variations for each project.

BRIGHT QUILTS FROM DOWN UNDER - 13 COLOR-CHARGED PROJECTS is a compilation from the Australian magazine Patchwork and Quilting. Every quilt is very easy, and the colors really make one happy.

Leslie Beck presents 36 popular quilting designs that reflect American history and nature-inspired patterns, in **BEST OF THE BEST QUILTS**. A variety of color combinations and quilting patterns will inspire everyone from beginners to advanced quilters.

You will find not only patchwork and applique, but also redwork in **SNOWFLAKE FOLLIES - QUILTS TO MAKE IN A WINTER WEEKEND** by Terry Martin .

A mini-lesson on fabrics from around the world, including Australia, Africa, Indonesia, and Asia, is a bonus in **A WORLD OF QUILTS** by Beth Ann Williams. The quilts are definitely beginner-friendly, but with the right choice of fabrics, are absolutely stunning.

Betty Ann Lynch and Ruth Sayers requested **SIMPLY SEMINOLE** by Dorothy Hanisko. We have several Seminole books in our library that I have used in the past, and this one features new patterns for us to try.

At a recent guild meeting a newer member asked me the best way to learn how to quilt. My advice was to start with a sampler class that would teach a different technique for each block. **QUILTING THE SAVORY GARDEN** by Sandra Millett is packed with information.

CELEBRATE THE TRADITION WITH C & T PUBLISHING, in honor of their 20th anniversary, tells the story of the birth of C & T, but it also has some very interesting block instructions, AND it will make a very good reference for our Library as it has pictures and biographies of some of the very best quilting authors (including our very own member, Judy Mathieson!), and photographs of all of the books C & T has published, so if you are looking for a particular book and can't remember the name, the picture of the cover might help you remember.

THE QUILT MANIAC'S PLAYBOOK - FUEL FOR THE IMAGINATION's author, Nicole C. Chambers, defines "maniac" as "a person who loves quilting with unbridled exuberance and zest" - so I definitely qualify as a "maniac." Many people have written about COLOR, but I seem to have gotten more out of this than usual. The quilt patterns all look very complicated, but with her instructions, are really very easy.

Joanne Larsen Line has written two companion booksto **THE QUILTMAKER'S GIFT**, the newest book being **MORE QUILTS FROM THE QUILTMAKER'S GIFT**.
