October Program & Workshop

October 16th — Strip Poker; bring twenty 21/2" strips, the width of the fabric October 17th — Strip piecing with scrappy girl, Betty Ann Lynch, Coddingtown Community Center

November Program & Workshop

Our speaker for the meeting on November 20 will be Lura Schwartz-Smith. Her topic will be *Journey of an Art Quilter*. This is a slide talk, a lighthearted retrospective look at the development of her work, covering almost 30 years of textile work and play. We'll see some things that worked, and

some that didn't, but were fun learning experiences. Some of the current techniques she uses and teach are shown. A small trunk show is given after the talk.

The workshop on November 21 will be *Traditionals Transformed*. We will be learning a free-form paperless curved machine piecing technique which allows students to build abstract texture in their quilts in a fast free manner. No applique — this is free-wheeling rotary cutting fun for those ready to try working more freely without patterns. This technique is very applicable to individual variations in each student's own style.

HINTS FOR PACKING AND SHIPPING QUILTS

(Editors note: These hints were passed on by Karey Bresenhan, Director of the International Quilt Festival in Houston.)

Re shipping methods: in Houston we use only FedX unless the quilter specifies another method of shipping. Trust me, we didn't reach that decision lightly, and we know all too well that it's the most costly way. But. You get what you pay for. We decided to go with FedX because, after 29 years of shipping quilts, we have found that FedX is the most dependable method and the least likely to just toss a quilt on the front porch and dash off. That doesn't mean they don't do it in some locations, more's the pity. (I happen to live in an area FedX deems "safe" so their policies DO permit leaving a box without a signature—it's infuriating. But it's no better with the other shippers.) It just means that they do it LESS than the others. There is no perfect way to ship your quilt short of hand-delivering it and picking it up after the show. There is always an element of risk involved. We try to minimize that risk by using FedX.

Re packing your quilt for shipping: In Houston we suggest that you fold or roll your quilt with the right side to the outside. It seems to help prevent wrinkles. That goes against the grain for most folks, who automatically fold or roll with the right side of the quilt IN...we strongly suggest that the right side of the quilt should be OUT. We suggest you place your quilt in an old washed pillowslip or other fabric "sack" that you don't need to have returned (when you are shipping more than 1000 quilts in 3 days, it is impossible to match

up your quilt with your great-grandmother's embroidered linen pillowslip!), and then place the whole "package" into a heavy duty plastic garbage bag, and then into a sturdy cardboard box or tube. The pillowslip (or fabric bag) protects the quilt from the plastic, and the plastic protects the quilt from rain or other misadventures with liquid. Always, always place your name, address, phone, etc. in an envelope INSIDE the box just in case the shipping label on the outside of the box goes astray. (It happens.) If you have specific shipping instructions, it doesn't hurt to include them. It also doesn't hurt to baste the shipping instructions to the back of your quilt. Be sure the ink you use is waterproof so if the quilt should get damp despite all the precautions, the ink won't smudge off onto your quilt. Or just laminate the instructions for safety's sake. Neither of these steps guarantees that your quilt will be packed and shipped just the way you want it, but it's better than depending on hope as a strategy.

Re addressing your quilt for shipping: Never, ever, ever use the word "quilt" anywhere on the box, in the shipping label, or in the return address. For example, if you are going to ship from a quilt shop because they have regular pickups and it's easy, instead of "Sue's Quilt Shop" in the return address, just say "Sue's Shop." If you are shipping to a quilt show, do NOT use the full name of the show. Instead of "International Quilt Festival" when shipping to Houston, say "International Festival" or "IQF" or "IQA Show" or use the name of the exhibit, ie "A World of Beauty."

Santa Rosa Quilt Guild Library

If you do not see the Library item you are looking for on the carts in the Meeting Room, fear not (or maybe you *should* start to be afraid!) because as with most good Libraries, all of our over 1440 books are not easily on view. I do apologize that the waiting line for my services is sometimes a long one. If I am not on hand to assist you immediately you may start looking for a book with the following hints:

My advice is to start with the proper title. I have a Black Binder in my tote bag

holding two computer lists – one with our Library books listed alphabetically by title, the other alphabetically by author. Once the title is known, then look in the file card boxes (located at the far end of the Library table) to ascertain whether or not the item is checked out. If the file card is in the box, add a Please Reserve with your name to the card. If the card is not in the box, then it SHOULD be either on the rolling cart or the kitchen cart near the Library table, OR in the cupboard in the storage room across the hall from our Meeting Room. There are typed lists of categories at the ends of the black rolling cart and on the side of cupboard. If the book you are seeking is in a "category" (such as Applique, Baby/Kids, History, Japanese, Log Cabin, Wearables), then it is easy to look for the book in those spots. If not, the job is more difficult as we must search through the shelves of books in the cupboard that are not categorized. The reward is that usually the seeker finds other books of interest to check out! And I DO encourage you to check out as many books as you with, but you really MUST return them at the next meeting to keep them circulating! Of course, I will do everything to help locate an item for you, as will the rest of the volunteers who put in so many hours in our Library area.

The more our Library is used, the better – and my rewards are the wonderful quilts that are made from ideas inspired by our books and magazines.

An Interview with Barbara Cortelyou

Barbara was born in in Ann Arbor, Michigan. When she was two years of age her father adamantly declared it to be the last time he would spend winter shoveling snow. He packed up his family and firmly stated he would not stop driving until he approached warm sunshine near water. That's the tale of how Barbara grew up in Venice, California. She attended UCLA, met Bob and married at age 18. They recently celebrated 41 joyful years together. They have two sons, one grandson and as Barbara put it, one grand puppy.

After a 25 year career as personnel employee, Barbara's free time includes quilting, bike riding and walks with Bob. She rather secretly described her addiction to Free Cell - a computer solitaire game. She said it's a completely time-wasting, fun thing which she enjoys.

Barbara recalled the days she spent with her grandmother, whom she credits for her own skills of sewing and crocheting, while in the same breath express her background to be "Quiltless". She elaborated on her grandmother's dignified, socially charming personality. I feel we enjoy the same traits in Barbara, not to mention her humor too!

A favorite aspect of Barb's quilting includes shopping for fabric. An often difficult problem for her is cutting a lovely piece of fabric. (She's not alone; there is a book Just Can't Cut It.) Her favorite kinds of quilting extend from whimsical to heirloom which she delights in giving to others. Her advice to new quilters is to keep learning, relax and enjoy creating quilts — and keep "cutting up".

I asked Barb what she understands now that she wished she had known years ago. She feels our society needs to show more encouragement and kindness toward one another, be less judgmental and more grateful for what we have in our lives. Learn who others are inside as opposed to initial appearances.
